Dear Families, Partners and Friends of Abbot's Lea School

This week I have two highlights for you – both demonstrating the **power of good communication**. In my work with external partners, communication and networking during the online events led to opportunities for participation in the Unicef training. On the other side, while focusing on support within the school, I heard about the struggles with bedtime some families experience and found recommended solutions in research. This newsletter summarises the key messages from the training as well as useful resources related to sleep.

Unicef UK Training

During this two-day training, I have discussed and analysed children's right in practice with local researchers, social workers and community officers. Our aim was to find ways to work with children and young people as equal partners. Following one of our conclusions, I would like to remind everyone of the Article 12 of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child:

Every child has the right to express their views, feelings and wishes in all matters affecting them, and to have their views considered and taken seriously.

This article establishes the right of every child to be heard in matters affecting them and for their views to be listened to and acted upon. I would like to emphasise a diversity of communication tools and methods used in our school for that exact reason.

The golden rule of participatory work is "Nothing About Me Without Me".

Autism and Sleep

According to a recent study published in the American Academy of Paediatrics, close to half of the autistic children and adults have significant difficulties with sleep. These difficulties can include problems falling asleep, night waking, early-morning waking, and shorter overall sleeping time. The cause of sleep problems has not been found, but there is evidence that sleep issues can worsen behavioural issues and difficulties with social interactions.

Brazil

On Thursday, we participated with Life Skills activities, this week we practised budgeting and completing a comparative shop to find the cheapest items. It has been a great week in Brazil class and we look forward to another fun week of learning next week.

Peru

This week, Peru class have been learning about different forms of punctuation, including how to use an apostrophe correctly. We have also practised comprehension tasks in English after finishing the penultimate chapter in our book. In Maths, we have been learning 2, 3 and 4-digit column subtraction and how to show our workings out. In food technology, we made sausage and cheese rolls following a list of instructions. They were delicious! Computing we have been using scratch and learning how to code. Physical education we have continued to work with the Liverpool football club coaches who have been helping improve our movement and speed. Afterwards we had a game of football. In Life skills, we explored what friendship means and looked at what it is that makes us a good friend.

Mozambique

This week in Mozambique, we have been learning about the empathy and compassion, and ways we can be compassionate to our friends, family and staff in school. This helped us while we learnt about the Black Lives Movement, as we were able to consider ways we could support BLM. Mozambique have also been practicing the school's Christmas song as well as building and decorating boxes we are going to decorate.

We have been continuing to study Africa as part of 'Our World' topic. We have begun creating some 3D African masks, learning where different countries are located within Africa. Well done for working so hard!

Botswana

This week in Botswana class, we have enjoyed using Lego to be creative and build some fantastic constructions. We have also written some lovely and creative stories in which we used African animals as the main characters. We hope you all have a lovely and restful weekend 😊

Madagascar

This week in Madagascar, we have been very busy. In English, we have been focusing on similes. We have created our own sentences involving similes. In R.E, we have been focusing on the big bang theory, evolution and Christian story. We discussed our own views on what

we all believe. In science, we have continued with electricity and have focused on dangers. We have created our own posters informing people of the dangers of electricity. In Art, we have focused on Gakonga and recreated them using oil pastels. Well Done Madagascar and enjoy your weekend.

Kenya

This week in Kenya Class, we read a new poem in English called Zanzibar by author Berlie Doherty who was born in Knotty Ash, only 16 minutes away from Abbot's Lea! The poem talked different spices, which are part of Zanzibar's main industry. It taught us about their hot and rainy climate and their culture too.

In history, we learned more about our topic: The Benin Kingdom. This week, we were researching the art the Benin people created. We used the laptops to find out about the different materials used and the animals and people they depicted.

Adding to our unit on electrical circuits, we did some work on conductors and insulators. We learned that conductors are materials, which allow electricity to pass through, and insulators do not. We also learned a few examples of these!

In Food Tech, we made our own wraps. This is an important life skill as most of the students in Kenya love wraps! We selected the ingredients we like, chopped them ourselves and created a wrap.

Last, but not least, today we had a great discussion about bullying. We talked about the differences between being rude, being mean and being a bully. We all agreed that bullying is completely wrong and unacceptable and any bullying, should be reported immediately to a member of staff or a parent. We also agreed that sticking up for our friends is a great thing to do.

Seychelles

We have had another great week this week. We got into two groups and made strawberry cheesecake. We crushed the biscuits for the base and made it stick together with melted butter, whisked together all the other ingredients and put it on top of the biscuit base. We then put it in the fridge and then tasted it the next day. It was absolutely delicious!

In English, we researched the different animals that we can find in Africa. We were all very surprised at the different animals that you can find and all of the things that they can do. Once we had all of information, we created individual PowerPoints and then presented them to the class.

In Music, we listened to different types of African drum music on the board. Then we sat in a circle and played the drums to the different beats that we could hear and tried to recreate the music as a class.

Fiji

A great week for class Fiji. We are finally back to school! All of the students have settled back into our class routines well and all of the students have worked really hard. We have continued with our Maths topic focusing on place value and decimal place value. We have also recorded our part for the school Christmas song in Music. In Science, we have looked at conductors and insulators. Overall a very busy couple of days. Enjoy your weekend class Fiji and don't forget... next week is CHRISTMAS WEEK ONE!!!!

Cape Verde

This week in Cape Verde has been really busy. We have worked on following instructions and independence skills. We made a chicken and bacon sandwich and a very tasty looking cheesecake. Australia

Samoa looked at climate change and all independently managed to produce a fact sheet and identified "arguments for and against humans causing climate change" Super effort with this lesson guys!

KS4 managed to get out of class for the PE lesson. Miss Loughran and Miss Purcell organized dance in the hall and Mr Murphy and Mr Lyons organized football on the field. Samoa staff are proud of each and every one of the pupils as they all took part and loved the PE lessons. A great change from being in the classroom.

The pupils were asked to paint an angry painting. The imagination that each pupil showed to produce the high standard of art was incredible.

Life skills with Mr Murphy was to do with recycling. The pupils were able to sort recycling and non-recyclable items and could explain why we have to recycle.

The Christmas countdown has started in Samoa Class. Everyone is excited about how close we are now to finishing. Even with this at the back of their minds, they are still producing their work to a very high standard.
