We do, naturally, respect our students' exemption, but want to encourage those who wish to wear masks to do so at any time when social distancing is not possible. Please share sensitively with your children, as you see fit.

Please also note that we will be increasing promotion of testing, including possibly setting up onsite testing for secondary aged students who consent to testing (or, if too young to consent, whose parents have consented). Previous DfE consent forms collated will be used and I advise that you may withdraw your consent at any time and you may also grant it now even if previously you withheld your consent. Dear Parents / Carers,

In recent weeks, we have seen a rapid rise in Covid-19 cases in Liverpool. Currently Liverpool has rates of 158/100,000 and is on an upward trajectory. The dominant strain of virus in the UK is called the Delta variant and we have seen a steep rise in COVID-19 cases locally. Evidence suggests the Delta variant spreads more easily than previous strains.

As a result, we are requesting that additional measures are brought into schools to slow down the spread of the virus. These controls may cause some disruption to end of year plans that normally take place. Activities such as transition, assemblies, proms and performances may need to be modified and alternative arrangements made. Educational visits may also be impacted by these additional measures.

Schools will communicate with parents directly if any of their plans are impacted.

Face Coverings

On the 21st June 2021, we are requesting staff and pupils in Year 7 and above to wear face coverings indoors whilst in school, including in classrooms where social distancing cannot be maintained, with the exception of certain lessons such as PE. This is an additional measure to support schools to manage the increased risk of school-based transmission due to increasing cases and is fully supported by central government.

The purpose of wearing a face covering is to minimise the risk of transmitting the virus to other people if you are infectious but don't have symptoms. We know that up to 30% of people with COVID-19 don't experience symptoms, and everyone who has the virus will be infectious in the two days before their symptoms start, so wearing face coverings

is one of a range of infection prevention and control measures that have been introduced in schools to protect pupils and staff.

Exemptions for wearing face coverings are still in place and further information about exemptions can be found here.

Any pupil who has one of the conditions on the exemption list will not be expected to wear a face covering whilst in school. Anyone communicating to someone who relies on lip reading will also be exempt from wearing a face covering.

We also continue to ask that parents and carers to wear face coverings when dropping off and picking up children from school.

Education Secretary Gavin Williamson has today written to secondary school and college parents and guardians in England to talk about the importance of regular testing when it comes to keeping covid out of the classroom.

The Prime Minister announced on 14 June that step 4 of the roadmap would have to be paused for up to four weeks because of the spread of the new variant.

With the increase in cases with variants of concern, it is important to continue regular testing in order to detect cases of coronavirus, stay ahead of the virus and keep covid out of the classroom.

This means that regular asymptomatic testing for all will continue, and we need you and your children who are in secondary school or college to carry on testing at home, twice a week.

As you know, testing has been playing a vital role in our response to the virus. It is helping to break chains of transmission by identifying asymptomatic positive cases quickly. This means those who test positive can self-isolate, keeping other pupils and students in face-to-face education. Reporting all test results, positive or negative, helps the health experts have a clearer picture of any potential outbreaks in different parts of the country.

I want to thank you all for your efforts so far. I know that this has been an enormously challenging time for families, who have faced many pressures over the past 18 months. Your continued support in helping us fight the virus has been vital.

Secondary pupils and college students, households and their bubbles, along with school and college staff have now completed more than 50 million tests since these were introduced back in January. That really is an incredible number and we need you to continue your efforts.

It is wonderful to see so many children back in school and through your actions we can work together to keep everyone safe ensuring we can also keep your children in school with their friends.

I write to formally update you on the arrangements for exams taking place at Abbot's Lea School next term.

All students in years 11, 12, 13 and 14 took part in the exams series in May. Students approached the exams in a mature manner, showing great resilience and determination.

All students have another opportunity to sit the exams towards the end of June. The exams will take place on:

Monday, 28 June 2021 - Functional Skills Maths papers (calculator and non-calculator) at 9:30am

Tuesday, 29 June 2021 - Functional Skills English (reading and writing) at 9:30am and 12:30pm

Wednesday, 30 June 2021 - Functional Skills ICT at 9:30am.

Students taking Entry Level 1 – 3 exams will take a paper based exam. Students taking Level 1 and 2 exams will take an online exam using school laptops.

The exams will take place in the school hall and also in some designated classrooms, as has been the case this term. All students will have access to the support they are entitled to.

As mentioned previously, students who remain with us next year will have another opportunity to engage with the accredited learning in 2021-22. Students progressing to other educational establishments at the end of this school year will also have such opportunities extended to them by their Further Education provider.



On Tuesday this week, we enjoyed our whole school twilight CPD session, where our theme was Maths.

As you might be aware, we have introduced the White Rose Maths Scheme of Work into our curriculum from EYFS to KS5. Having moderated and researched different schemes of work, I was impressed by what this has to offer. We discussed as a staff the need to constantly (not just at points throughout the year) share with you what knowledge your child is accruing in Maths.

Therefore, from now on, when evidence is uploaded to *Evidence for Learning*, you will see that it will be attached to a "framework". This will tell you which specific pieces of mathematical knowledge has been covered.

We will be rolling this system out on *Evidence for Learning* for all subjects and I will update you, as each new framework is ready!

Dear colleagues, families and friends of Abbot's Lea School

I am sure you can all list our 5 senses, but did you know that we use more than just vision, hearing, taste, touch and smell for our daily functioning? Our vestibular system and proprioception are crucial for understanding environment and our place in it. Our sensory worlds are very complex and interesting to explore.

This week we launched our Students' and Families' activity that gives you an opportunity to learn more about all of our senses, discover individual differences through questions we prepared for you and implement strategies to accommodate the unique differences. While we recognise hyposensitivity (less intense perception) and hypersensitivity (more intense perception), there is a whole spectrum of individual perception levels.

By clicking on the link below, you will access a survey that is longer than our typical surveys, but this time it includes:

- a video introduction for each sense (learn something new)
- a set of questions to recognise hyposensitivity and hypersensitivity
- a set of recommendations that you can use from today

The questions and recommendations are created in collaboration with our Occupational and Sensory Integration Therapist, Tara Connolly.

To respect the time you might need to do this meaningfully, we have integrated the function to save progress and continue later. By entering your preferred email address, the system will send you a link to access the work you completed and continue.

I encourage you to take the time needed and complete this activity in the way that can benefit a student to identify and recognise its sensory needs, a parent/carer to have strategies to use to accommodate those needs, and the whole school team to improve our environment and practice to support our students in the best way.

I often write newsletter articles related to a particular theme such as mental health or safeguarding. Often these are marked by special days or weeks and last week I drew your attention to Infant Mental Health Awareness week. I sometimes feel that there are too many of these days now and important issues may get lost in the never ending cycle of 'raising awareness'.

However, tomorrow marks such an important day that I cannot let it pass without recognising it. On June 19, America celebrates Juneteenth. This day celebrates the end of slavery and has become an official federal holiday. Slavery in America was a brutal system used by white people that lasted for hundreds of years. By laying out this timeline, children see the impact of how long slaves endured their captivity before being liberated. That's why Juneteenth is also called Freedom Day.

'Free-ish since 1865' is popular slogan used for Juneteenth, and it couldn't be more true. Black people in America are still oppressed, underrepresented, and screaming for equality. In recent years, and particularly following nationwide protests over police brutality and the deaths of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery and other Black Americans, there is a renewed interest in the day that celebrates freedom. The 'Black Lives Matter' movement has stretched beyond the United States as people around the world have responded to the continued racism and micro-aggressions suffered by the Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic communities.

Teaching our children about equality must also include acknowledging Black history. Black stories and Black storytellers remain less visible than their white counterparts. We must recognise the historical predominance of white-centred narratives that permeate the cultural and political conversations in this country and work harder to ensure all voices are amplified. <u>Italy</u>

This week in Italy Class, we have been continuing our topic of fractions in Maths. We have been finding objects in our classroom and drawing around them to find if we could split them in half evenly. In English, we have been reading poems and highlighting the rhyming words. In food technology we discussed the euros and tried different foods from different European countries, the class discussed our favourite dishes. We have been continuing to look after our

plants in topic along with having a mini beast hunt around the school grounds. Well done Italy Class!

France

What a wonderful week we have had in class France! We have had lots of fun learning more about our topic through a range of different activities. On Monday, we looked closely at common garden plants and learned about the functions of the different parts. On Tuesday, we visited Walton Hall Gardens to see the beautiful grounds and local farm animals. On Wednesday, we spoke about what creatures we would find in our gardens and parks. The pupils then completed a sensory circuit matching familiar mini-beasts to their microhabitats. For English this week we have continued our mini-beast theme by writing descriptive sentences about our favourite insects. In Maths, the pupils have worked hard in their fractions work. This week we looked more in-depth into quarters by creating our own pizzas with different toppings on the quarters. Keep up the hard work class France!'

<u>Canada</u>

We have had a lovely week in Canada class! This week we have been really focusing on our capital letters and full stops in our sentences. Every morning, we come in and write a sentence about what we did the night before, Canada class are pros at this now! In maths, we are still looking at halves and quarters. We are able to split things into 2 or 4 equal groups to create halves and quarters. The students have really impressed the class team in maths! In English, we have been planning our own teddy bear's picnic! We all wrote shopping lists of our favourite foods and drinks and prepared our very own sandwiches for the picnic! On Wednesday, we took the blankets and games outside and brought our favourite teddy bears and we had a lovely time! It was a great opportunity for Canada class to share things, take turns and play together. On Tuesday, we were so lucky to take part in a bike ability session! All of the students tried so hard and some were already able to ride on their own! Canada class have worked so hard all week and we are really proud, have a lovely weekend!

<u>USA</u>

USA started the week with a new topic in Maths of fractions. We gave the students a challenge to see how much they already knew about fractions. We were so impressed by how much the students already knew and how they worked independently. In Food Technology, we have been looking at different ways of cooking eggs. This week we boiled them. We put eggs in the water for different lengths of time to see how different they looked when we cut them open. Some students said they did not like eggs but they still tried them, which was fantastic. We had our bike-a-bility session on Tuesday some of the students had never rode a bike before and were incredibly brave in having a go. We also had our first dance lesson and made fruit kebabs which were delicious. In Life Skills, we have been learning about how to keep to a budget. The students were incredibly interested in this, went through a budget as a class and looked at changes that can be made to have more money left over.

<u>Spain</u>

Spain class have had an excellent week.

In English, we have been reading super worm.

Similarly, super beasts and their habitats have been our theme in science and geography. We also planted some seeds.

Halves and quarters is still the topic in Math's, we have been practicing using a ruler to half shapes.

In RE we reflected on our weekend and spoke about what we did, and how it made us feel. In food tech, we made delicious lady-bird cookies.

Finally, for art we made a couple of pieces such as paint works and decorating butterfly cut outs' with flowers.

Portugal

This week in Class Portugal, we have been learning all about minibeasts and plants! On Monday, we planted some seeds that we will be watching grow over the coming weeks. We spoke about what plants need in order to grow. The children loved this! We have also been enjoying the school grounds this week, we went on a minibeast hunt and found lots' of different creatures around the site - bees, butterflies, snails, ants - it was lots of fun!

The children have also been writing letters to send home, learning about how we write a letter and how to write an address on the envelope. We hope the families enjoy receiving these soon!

<u>Brazil</u>

This week the students have looked at traditional poetry. The students have read the poem 'The Sounds in the Evening' and used adjectives to describe sounds they might hear in different settings. We have also visited Crosby beach and looked at the iron men as part of Anthony Gormley's artwork, this has provided us with inspiration for our project 'I Am Warrior'. We look forward to another fun week of learning next week.

<u>Peru</u>

Hello from Peru class. This week we have worked hard as usual, in Maths some pupil's used the Bee bots when working on angles and turns. They had to work out the co-ordinates to end up at a certain destination on the Bee bot map, they also chose a destination for their friends' to end up at and they had to figure out how to arrive there. In English this week, we looked at extending our sentences using fronted adverbials. Food technology we made chicken salad baguettes, we used knives to cut celery and red onion and mixed it in with lettuce adding mayonnaise and a touch of mustard. The mix was added to the baguette and then chicken was added, it was a good choice quite a few students enjoyed eating theirs afterwards. To coincide with our I Am Warrior topic Peru class visited Crosby beach to look at the iron men, fun was had by all. This week for topic we looked more at Rome and the impact the Romans' had, we also researched some famous landmarks in Italy and the UK. Have a nice weekend!

Botswana

This week in Botswana, we have been learning about hygiene and ways in which to keep ourselves clean. We have also been on a scavenger hunt on the school grounds trying to find symbols that where placed around the forest area. Students have been very engaged and have even managed to make a chicken sandwich this week using a variety of fillings. We have been building 3D shaped and 2D shapes in maths.

Mozambique

Great week for Mozambique class. We have continued with I am warrior in project and learned all about the Celts and had a go at designing a Celtic knot. In food tech, we made chicken salad baguettes, they were really tasty! In life-skills, we learnt how to use a washing machine

and what the different safety symbols meant. In maths, we have continued to learn about shapes and have been using different ways to categorise and organise them. We enjoyed using tree diagrams to help us with this. In literacy, we have been focusing on dialogue and speech and have been practising how to use punctuation correctly when writing direct speech. On Friday, we got to take part in bike ability and developed our gross motor skills. Have a great weekend!

Madagascar

This week Class Madagascar have worked on and produced some amazing non-chronological reports in English. Students chose their favourite topics as the subject of these reports and researched this. Reports where produced on Minecraft, Liverpool Football Club and Super Mario bros 3 to name a few.

In Maths, students have begun the topic of angles. At first students identified the different types of angles including acute, obtuse and reflex angles before using a protractor to measure these angles. Staff noticed some amazing effort and work.

In Food Technology students made a healthy chicken salad sandwich and in their Project lessons students continued their work on the Romans designing their own Roman shields, looking at the life of a Gladiator, where they came from, what they wore, who they fought etc. In Art, students made their own mosaic patterns and in Life Skills, students have begun to explore personal hygiene. Yet another great week in Class Madagascar.

<u>Kenya</u>

Kenya class have been busy working hard. In English, we have started to read the book 'Mr Stink' by David Walliams. We are enjoying the story so far and have been able to answer comprehension questions well. In Maths this week, we are beginning to look at how to change the position of shapes and angles, our previous week's work on co-ordinates have really helped us with this. We are enjoying learning about 'Celts' in our topic work. We have learnt a lot about the types of houses they used to live in and have been making comparisons to our modern day homes.
