We have participated in many sensory, craft and musical lessons to look at African Art, Music and Storytelling. On Wednesday, we really enjoyed our trip to the Tudor Exhibition and The World Museum in Liverpool City Centre! It's been a brilliant first week back. Have a lovely weekend Spain Class!
Italy Class Teacher: Mrs Cooney	Wow! What a week for Italy class! We also wrote some amazing poetry based on Africa - we can't wait for you to read them!

We have learnt about the transatlantic slave trade, written our own poems about Africa and created lots of beautiful art from Ndebele canvas' to African masks. We have read about some influential African people and learnt about 'The Big 5'. We have definitely shown our creativity this week and worked really hard in all tasks. We hope you have a lovely and restful weekend.
USA Class Teacher: Mrs Suku	USA class have had a great week back. We completed the World Reimagined project focusing on African cultures and Slave Trade. On Monday, we looked at some African art and moved our bodies to recreate some of the symbols. We also completed poetry on African masks and looked at our own mask brought from an actual African tribe. We talked about slavery and thought about our senses when describing life on a slave ship. Joining in with some African dance and drumming was our favourite part of the week. Well done USA class! Have a great weekend!
Brazil Class Teacher: Mrs Rodway	Welcome back to Brazil class! Its lovely to be back in school. All the pupils have enjoyed being back this week and it's been great to hear what the students have been doing during the holidays. This week we have embraced our collapsed curriculum week - The World Reimagined. We have listened to the story of Floella Benjamin Coming to England and talked about the Windrush generation. We looked at African symbols, dances and musical instruments and on Wednesday we took a trip to the Walker Art Gallery. As a class we tasted foods from other cultures and found out about the slave trade. Well done Brazil class for fully engaging in this topic.
Kenya Class Teacher: Miss McClintock	This week Kenya Class have been taking part in the world reimagined project. We started our week by learning all about the continent of Africa, we looked at different misconceptions people have about it and along with some of the culture and traditions. We then moved onto learn about African Icons, the roles they played and why they are important researching our own icons. One icon we learnt about was Nana Benz. We tried some weaving just as Nana Benz used to create her fortune. This week we also tried some traditional African foods, we learnt about where they come from and evaluated them at the end.
Cape Verde Class Teacher: Mr Hatton	This week has been a closed curriculum week in which we have looked at the topic World reimagined and in particular the continent of Africa. The class have looked at the art of Africa and have created some amazing pieces of art work from the flag designing using tiles and paint to creating African masks out of salt dough. The pupils also enjoyed an amazing trip to the Art gallery and World museum where they were able to explore the Tudors artwork and clothes. They then were able to look at most of the

This week, we have been following a collapsed curriculum based on the topic of 'The World Reimagined' which focuses on African history and culture. They have also studied the abolition movement and have written a speech in order to convince the public to end slavery. 

Australia Class Teacher: Mr Lyons	This week we have focused on Mother Africa and the Transatlantic Slave Trade, the class enjoyed a trip to the Maritime Museum consolidating their knowledge.
Samoa Class Teacher: Miss Gibney	This has been a fabulous start to the new and final term of the year, we can't believe how fast this school year has gone! But we are taking every opportunity to enrich our learning, as this week Samoa class have been exploring the world reimagined week! We have been learning all about the transatlantic slave trade and exploring mother Africa in all her glory! They have been looking at the impact that the slave trade had in history, and how it has affected life as we know it today. They also explored the African culture in different forms, they researched and made clay statues to replicate those that were made by African tribes. They explored the different forms of art that have been developed and adapted throughout the years with different African tribes. They also took part in an amazing school wide competition, where they designed African inspired posters and created poems inspired by the slave trade, we had some very impressive entries! We also enjoyed a very informative trip to the Liverpool Maritime museum. They had an amazing time exploring the different exhibits and learning new things. They saw historical artefacts and sculptures that had been restored from years and years ago. Samoa class would like to thank Ms Suku and Miss Gibney for organising such an amazing week of learning! As always, the class also worked very hard in their various accredited learning classes, where they explored new and exciting topics for this term, including cartoon art, rounders in PE and learning how to make simple healthy meals in food tech. Towards the end of the week the class celebrated the festival of learning, where their amazing work from across the year is on display for staff and families to appreciate! Samoa class should be extremely proud of all the hard work they have completed this year, you have all been amazing!
Papua New Guinea Class Teacher: Mrs Wong	PNG had a fantastic week this week. We focused on World Reimagined week looking at how the transatlantic slave trade has impacted Africa and their people. We did various activities throughout the week to enhance our understanding on this topic and studies the stolen legacy of Africa. In English we researched about various ancient African empire. We recapped on the different writing techniques we could use to write poems. We also looked at different types of poems before writing our own. We then created some posters about the transatlantic slave trade for display board. In history, we looked at a few individuals who played prominent parts in the transatlantic slave trade, such as Robert Milligan and Edward Colston. In Art, we expanded our understanding on African art by expressing our opinions among ancient, modern and contemporary African sculptures. We made African textile art and displayed them on our art wall. We also used the work of Kwame Akoto Bamfo to explain how public art can be used to address an imbalance in the narrative of the transatlantic slave trade. We went to Maritime Museum - International Slavery Museum on Wednesday, heard the untold stories of enslaved people and learned about historical and contemporary slavery. In the morning settling in task we challenged ourselves with wordle, woldle, globe, heardle and numbele. In the afternoon, we keep up with what's going on around us watching news round.
