- 5. Story/Literature Connections

I would like to alert the families of students in Year 8 to the HPV vaccination programme that is continuing to be offered in school despite the national lockdown.

Girls and boys aged 12 to 13 years are offered the human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine as part of the NHS vaccination programme.

The HPV vaccine helps protect against cancers caused by HPV, including:

- cervical cancer
- some mouth and throat (head and neck) cancers
- some cancers of the anal and genital areas

It also helps protect against genital warts

In England, girls and boys aged 12 to 13 years are routinely offered the 1st HPV vaccination when they are in Year 8. The 2nd dose is offered 6 to 24 months after the 1st dose.

The immunisation team will be in school on Wednesday 27 January and families are encouraged to book an appointment for their child to receive the vaccination.

Appointments will be offered between 9:30am and 1:30pm. Please note that students should not be displaying any COVID symptoms and will not have any contact with anyone other than the immunisation team on the day (unless they are already attending school).

In English we carried on reading Old Bear and retold the story using Chatta, we also used adjectives to describe Old Bear. In Maths, we explored positional language. We programmed the BeeBots to travel in front, behind, on top and next to different characters from Old Bear. In Science, we identified properties of different materials in our classroom and grouped them. We had a great Music lesson this week. We kept the beat and rhythm of certain songs using different instruments and discussed the difference between the beat and rhythm. We also designed and created our very own felt teddy bear. We stuffed them with stuffing and stitched it together!

Wales Home Learners

The children at home have been working so hard! In English, we have been reading Kipper's Toybox, concentrating on the characters and the order of events. We were so good at sequencing the story! In Maths, we have been learning how to solve word problems by finding the number sentence in disguise. In Science, we have explored materials even further by sorting and grouping them into categories according to their properties and in Art, we explored the artwork of Kansinsky, even making our own! Hello France class! This week has been a little different for us all as I have been at home delivering the remote learning. It has been so lovely to see how well those of you at home have been interacting with the remote learning and the wonderful work you have completed. Well done also to those who have worked hard in school this week with Miss McClintock and Miss Hughes. For Science this half term we have been learning about Forces. This week we focused on 'friction' and completed experiments in school and at home seeing how friction works on different surfaces. As part of our PSHE and Life Skills work, we have been talking about friendship and how to be a good friend. The pupils then created their own posters to show what makes a good friend. For Maths, we have continued our Measurement work and have been learning how to read cm on a ruler accurately. The pupils had lots of fun measuring objects at home and in school.

Canada and USA Learners on site

USA and Canada class have had such an exciting week. We made a very tasty Spaghetti Bolognese. The students chopped the vegetables and stirred them into the meat. They were incredibly sensible using the hot stove and using sharp knives. When we had completed it, the students tasted some and took some home. They said it was 'tasty' and 'delicious.' We have also been looking at time this week and the students learnt how to tell the time when it is o'clock and half past. We have learnt how to say our colours in French. The students remembered them so well. We played a splat

game to see how quick we could remember them. Well done USA and Canada bubble. You have had an amazing week.

USA

USA have continued to impress us with their engagement with remote learning this week. In English, we rounded off our topic of the BFG by listening to a short summary of the story and writing our own review of the book. We are looking forward to learning more about Roald Dahls other stories over the next few weeks. In Maths, we have been focusing on measurement. In our first session, we looked at weight, searching our houses for objects to order from lightest to heaviest. We then looked at length, and played an interactive game together to test our knowledge of how to measure length with a ruler. Everyone was excellent at this and demonstrated their measuring skills perfectly!

In Life Skills, we discussed friendship, thinking in particular about why friends are so important, and how to make friends. USA had so many great points to add to our class conversation — it was great to see everyone get involved. We also included an additional practical task of making a sandwich for ourselves or a member of our family and shared them on our afternoon session. We had practised this in school before Christmas, so we now had the opportunity to use the skills we had learnt in the classroom at home. In Music, we looked at different genres and discussed what genres we all like best, as everyone has different tastes. We researched our own favourite songs and musicians and found out what genre of music they fall under. We are all so proud of the work you have done this week USA — keep it up!

Spain Home Learners

Congratulations to Spain Class Home Learners another great week of Home Learning, you are doing great completing the daily Life skills challenge and doing the daily work tasks. Each morning we have a zoom picture quiz at 11am and a catch up in the afternoon. Spain home learners have all done some great work on finding out about recycling.

This week we are completing activities relating to Tiddler -The Story Telling Fish by Julia Donaldson. We continued with our Topic South America looking at the map, different types of weather, and landmarks and creating instruments. In Maths, we are continuing with shape and measurement by measuring items in the home.

The different forces have still been the topic in science. The class have been gently demonstrating in pairs what the motion of pulling, pushing and twisting looks like. As well as using the toy cars to test what happens when you use a lot of particular force in comparison to just using a little bit.

In Geography, the class have been learning about South America. In particular, we have learned a lot about the Amazon rainforest and Brazil.

This week in Peru, we have started our science topic on inheritance and evolution. We have discussed characteristics and physical features inherited from our biological parents and identified what was different and similar in terms of physical appearance by comparing images of Miss Curran and her large family. Next, we are looking at evolution and particularly the adaptations that different animals have living in their habitats

Mozambique

This week Mozambique have been reading 'The Day the Crayons Quit' and finding the different ways apostrophes have been used in the letters and how they alter the word. We also assisted Mrs Stokes in creating her perfect sandwich and created our own shopping lists and recipe to make our own sandwich had have been given the task to make our own lunch this week. This was continued on Friday, when we read 'The Dinosaur's Packed Lunch' by Jacqueline Wilson. During geography, we studied all about the UK, including the capital cities and the countries that make up the UK.

Botswana

This week during our remote learning we have started to read George's marvellous medicine, we have written our own ingredients for a marvellous medicine and have learnt all about arrays. We have learnt about online safety and how to keep ourselves safe whilst using the internet - we produced lovely posters and designed a safe a secure website. We took part in some P.E this week, whilst learning all about how to keep our bodies healthy.

<u>Madagascar</u>

Madagascar class have been working really hard this week. In English, we continued to read our book ' George's marvellous medicine' and answer comprehension questions based on the chapter we read. In maths we focused on adapting our times tables and completed times table Rockstars.

In Geography, we discussed global warming as a group and talked about what we could do to help as a school and as individuals. We created our own posters on global warming and what we could do to help. Some of us wrote letters, addressing global warming and what we could do better and how to implement this within our community.

For life skills, this week Madagascar class asked for a bake off. Many students including the staff created their own cakes. We followed instructions carefully to make our creations. We showed these off over zoom. Madagascar class definitely have some upcoming bakers! Well done everybody.

Kenya

This week in Kenya class, we have been continuing with working on our times tables. We have been practising on our 3x and 4x table both on TTRockstar and in zoom. We have had some more practise on writing out our number sentences in different ways using both multiplications and divisions. Our words of the week this week are 'product' and 'quotient' meaning the answer to multiplication and division respectively. In English, we have recapped on the use of apostrophe for omission. All of us have done really well on this and have learnt that the contractions are usually seen in informal English. We are continuing with Holes in our reading sessions. We have noticed a little change in the main character – Stanley, both physically and mentally. We have also looked at the four different types of conflicts in literature and how these can help a story to build up tension and make the readers read on. We cannot wait to 'dig out' the truth of what the boys are really digging for.

Seychelles

This week Seychelles class have had so much fun during our zoom lessons! In English, we have been looking at famous Authors and discussing the story, 'The Iron Man' the students created their own dialogues between the characters, using either sentences or in the form of a storyboard. In Math's we have played lots' of different number games and worked fantastically as a team to find the correct answers! We all took part in a quiz, which all the students participated their own questions for and we all had so much fun joining in. Everyone has worked so hard this week and we are so proud of you all. All students have now mastered long multiplication and we have moved onto short division. We are making steady progress! In English, we have enjoyed two more chapters of Georges Marvellous Medicine. - All records should be accurate, relevant and still required for the purpose for which they were obtained. Keep this under regular review.
- Do Spring clean, practice data minimisation and dispose securely of any data that you no longer need. This will help you to comply with all aspects of the Data Protection Act (DPA)
- Ensure your devices are all password protected.

When you are finished using your computer or laptop, power it off. Leaving computing devices on, and most often, connected to the Internet, opens the door for rogue attacks. "Leaving your computer connected to the Internet when it's not in use gives scammers 24/7 access to install malware and commit cybercrimes. To be safe, turn off your computer when it is not in use.


