### Exams - June

Ref: Exams - June 2021

I write to formally update you on the arrangements for exams taking place at Abbot's Lea School next term.

All students in years 11, 12, 13 and 14 took part in the exams series in May. Students approached the exams in a mature manner, showing great resilience and determination.

All students have another opportunity to sit the exams towards the end of June. The exams will take place on:

Monday, 28 June 2021 - Functional Skills Maths papers (calculator and non-calculator) at 9:30am

Tuesday, 29 June 2021 - Functional Skills English (reading and writing) at 9:30am and 12:30pm

Wednesday, 30 June 2021 - Functional Skills ICT at 9:30am.

Students taking Entry Level 1 - 3 exams will take a paper based exam. Students taking Level 1 and 2 exams will take an online exam using school laptops.

The exams will take place in the school hall and also in some designated classrooms, as has been the case this term. All students will have access to the support they are entitled to

As mentioned previously, students who remain with us next year will have another opportunity to engage with the accredited learning in 2021-22. Students progressing to other educational establishments at the end of this school year will also have such opportunities extended to them by their Further Education provider.



This week is Infant Mental Health Awareness week. Infant mental health refers to the social and emotional wellbeing and development of children in the earliest years of life. The theme for Infant Mental Health Awareness Week 2021 is 'including infants in children and young people's mental health.' The goal of this year's theme is to encourage everyone working in children and young people's mental health policies, strategies and services to both think about and include babies.

As a parent or caregiver, giving babies a sense of security and belonging is an early sign of positive infant mental health. Loving, nurturing, responsive relationships provide young children with a sense of comfort, safety and confidence and lays a foundation for lifelong mental and physical health. A child's brain makes one million neural connections every single second, and positive and supportive experiences with parents and carers from birth can help children learn how to control their emotions, cope with stress and develop new skills that serve as a foundation for later life

Babies' emotional wellbeing influences how they experience, manage and express emotions. Parents' responses shape their learning and as adults we can offer physical touch and comfort, calm tone of voice, eye contact, smiles, repeated words, and praise. When we respond positively and meet their needs, babies develop trust, attachment, and confidence in us as caregivers.

Infant Mental Health Awareness Week "provides an opportunity for everyone working in the sector to raise awareness of the importance of babies' social and emotional development, and to share work they are doing," explains the Parent-Infant Foundation. One of the Parent-Infant Foundation's main aims is to raise awareness of the importance of infant mental health. The charity promotes a need to understand the first 1001 days from conception to age two, and how this stage is a period of rapid development where early experiences can affect not only babies' emotional wellbeing, but also influence how their bodies and brains develop. We also visited the farm that came to our school where we saw and petted different farm animals, such as pigs, sheep, a pony, rabbits, chickens, a chinchilla and guinea pigs. We also experienced our first Judo session in our PE lesson, which was great fun! We enjoyed our Music lesson on Monday too where we used different musical instruments to copy the beat! ### **Wales**

Class Wales have had an action packed first week back full of amazing visits! We had a visit from Alldays Farm. We got the chance to meet and pet different farm animals such as goats, pigs, sheep and a pony! We discussed how to care for them, where they originate from and what types of food they eat. ### **Italy**

Italy Class have had a busy first week of term. We started our week with a visit from the farm, the farmers talked about lots' of different animals and how to care for them. Italy class had a go at brushing the pony. In maths, we have been learning about fractions, how to equally share objects into the correct fraction. In English, we have been learning about poetry and recognising rhyming words. We have started our new topic of plants and looked at what is the most common types of wildflowers we can see around our school and at our houses. We finished the week with bike-a-bility practicing and learning how to ride a bike. Well done Italy Class.

### **France**

We have had a wonderful, fun filled first week of Term 6. The students have come back refreshed from their break and settled right back into our routine and activities. On Monday, we had a visit from a local farm. The class loved learning about the different animals, in particular the miniature pony who they had a chance to groom! On Tuesday, we started our new topic, which focuses on what is inside our gardens. We spoke about what plants, trees and mini-beasts we find in our own gardens then went on a lovely walk around the school grounds to identify different flowers and plants. On Wednesday, we continued with our Topic work by planting our class sunflowers. We've set up an investigation with our plants to see how they grow in different conditions- we're looking forward to watching them grow over the next few weeks and seeing if your predictions were correct! For PE this week we have also started our new Yoga sessions. The class, thoroughly enjoyed their first session and are looking forward to more over the rest of the term.

#### Canada

We have had a great first week back after half term and have been really enjoying the lovely weather! We have begun a new science unit looking at growing things and mini-beasts. We walked around the school grounds and found lots of flowers and weeds and we then learned to identify the parts of a plant. On Tuesday, we were so lucky to see the farm that came to school! We loved stroking the pigs, rabbits and the rest of the animals. Canada class' favourite was Mr Tumble the pony! We also had a great dance lesson on Tuesday and really enjoyed playing lots' of fun games to music. On Wednesday, we learned about money in life skills. We learned to identify the different coins and notes and discussed what we need money for and how to get it. This week we have also been observing our caterpillars and they have now all hatched from their chrysalises as butterflies! We cannot wait to release them and watch them fly away. In maths, we have begun learning about fractions and splitting things into halves and quarters and in English we are going to be planning our very own picnic after having read the Teddy Bear's Picnic! Canada class have worked so hard, and the staff team are so proud!

### **USA**

USA have had an amazing week. We started the week with a visit from the farm. We saw so many animals. There were pigs, goats, chinchillas and a sheep that was so big Miss Davies thought it was a cow!! When we got back to class, we researched our favourite farm animal

and made a PowerPoint to present the information to the class. On Tuesday, we had such a lovely day. We went to our outdoor learning area to see how many mini beasts we could find. There were so many, we looked underneath rocks and logs and saw the bugs in their natural habitat. We were very careful to put them back where we got them. We had then planned to go to Crosby Beach but unfortunately, due to roadworks it would take too long to get there so we changed our plans and went to Otterspool Promenade instead. We were so proud of USA class, they were phenomenal advocates for the school. During Life Skills, we learnt about different ways to pay for things, and the best payment method for larger or smaller items. We then did food technology and made delicious scrambled eggs. Some students said they did not like them but they still tried them, which was fantastic. Well done, on a brilliant first week back USA! We know we are going to have an amazing final term.

#### **Spain**

#### Peru

Hello from Peru Class! A busy week has been had by us all. We started our new project topic which is I am Warrior, to introduce it we played a game of 'Capture the Flag', splitting the class into two groups one being the Celts and the other the Romans. The players used the grounds

of the school to hide their flag and worked together to try to get their opponents flag; fun was had by all. On Monday, we watched some videos on recycling and completed a comprehension linked to this to embrace World Environment Day, which had actually fallen on the Saturday of half term. Maths this week has been based on angles and turns, Peru class physically made the turns using a hoop to stand in and used a clock to help find quarter, half, three quarter and full turns. We completed some worksheets to show we understood how this worked. Abbot's Lea have had the farm in this week and Peru class had a time slot to go and see the animals. We saw pigs, sheep, a pony, rabbits and chickens. We discovered that Chinchillas do not bathe in water, as their coats are too thick so they use sand and we had the pleasure of seeing this in action, he was super cute! English this week we looked at traditional poetry and rated them using a traffic light code saying we liked it, thought it was all right or we did not like it. The poets we looked at where Eleanor Farjeon and Charles Causley. P.E this week we had a game of quick cricket. Hope you all have an enjoyable weekend and see everyone on Monday.

#### Botswana

This week in Botswana, we have been recapping making 2d and 3d shapes. In English we have learnt about proverbs, we shared some we already know and researched the meaning of others. We had so much fun at the farm, leaning about all the different animals and petting them. We enjoyed watching the grand finale of ALS got talent, and we want to congratulate all of the participants and of course the winner Paul; you were all amazing! ### **Mozambique**

This week in Mozambique class, we have started looking at our new topic 'I am warrior' and explored Roman and Celtic warriors. In literacy, we learnt about world ocean day and wrote our own acrostic poems. In Life skills, we began a new topic of personal hygiene and paid particular attention to oral health. In food tech, we made our very own tuna pasta and we also really enjoyed a visit from the farm where we got to see and touch a variety of small animals.

#### Madagascar

This week Madagascar have been busy again, in English students have explored non-chronological reports and looked at the elements they should include such as captions, headings, sub headings and introductions. In Maths, students have been looking at angles. In food technology students made tuna pasta with mayonnaise, onions and sweetcorn before tasting a little of this.

In their project lesson, students have explored a Roman timeline, discussed where a Roman fortress could be built and why and designed their own Roman shield. Well done Madagascar class.

### Kenya

Kenya have been working hard this week. In Maths, we have been learning about coordinates. We are able to solve problems finding and plotting coordinates on a graph. We have started looking at the early history of Britain, this week we have been learning the Celts. In Life Skills, we have been learning about 'Puberty'. The students were very sensible and were able to talk about changes that happen in both males and females. We had an unexpected Yoga session on Thursday, Kenya really enjoyed this and learnt lots' of new poses. We are looking forward to more sessions for the remainder of the term. We also had a visit from the farm this week. Kenya enjoyed learning facts about the many animals that where brought in and enjoyed petting them. Apologies to all the parents who now have requests for new pets! Keep up the hard work Kenya!

### **Seychelles**

Seychelles have enjoyed their first week back after half term. In PE, we went onto the school field and did some 50-meter sprints. In English, we started to read the Demon Dentist as a class taking it in turns to read. We also did some work on past tenses. On Wednesday, we had a visit from Alldays Farm who brought along different animals including Pigs, Goats, Rabbits, Guinea pigs, Chinchillas, a Cockerel and a Pony. The pupils stroked the animals if they wished to and told different facts about the animals. During life skills, we talked about personal hygiene, how we have to look after ourselves and then discussed different scenarios, which we may face in everyday life. In History this week, we started our new topic Iron Warriors and we talked about Roman Soldiers and Celtic Warriors. We have been working in groups to research facts about them and record our findings.
