Early Years and Key Stage 1

Ireland class

This week in Ireland class we have been working on our physical development.

The boys and girls have enjoyed building towers with a range of resources such as the wooden blocks and magnatiles, practising our cutting skills and showing preference for their dominant hand during mark making time. The children have enjoyed learning all about 2D shapes this week. We have sang our shape song, completed matching shapes games and talking about how many sides each shape has. Ireland class have also been developing their fine motor skills by using the beads and string to thread.

Wales class

This week in Wales class we have been exploring our story "Owl Babies", focusing on counting and developing conversations. The children have used lots of different materials and media to make owls, their creations are on display in class.

The students have enjoyed taking part in world science day where we did an ice experiment and had fun watching the changes happen.

We also worked with LFC coaches and also took part in DT looking at vehicles and how we could build them with Knex, students could build them and label the different parts of the vehicle, during Science we looked at a range of different materials and took a walk around school looking for them.

This week, in Design and Technology we have looked at different parts that make a moving vehicle and the students learned new terminology (axel, chassis, wheels and washer) and showed a strong understanding of what they are used for, then drawn these parts and used their designs to build their own moving vehicles using K'Nex and Lego - they were brilliant!

We continued to make our story maps for our story in English and produced some beautiful handwriting and showed our excellent fine motor skills by cutting and sticking the pictures in order. In Geography we looked at how to locate our school in our local area using the iPads and Google Earth and in Computing explored what technology we have around us by completing a scavenger hunt around class to find different pieces of technology and what they are used for. It has been an amazing week!

Key Stage 3

Mozambique class

This week Mozambique class have worked really hard in their new Math classes, we have started our new topic on fractions.

In Geography we looked at different countries in the United Kingdom. In Computing we learnt about different types of technology and the components needed for them to run. Have a great weekend!

Cape Verde class

It's been a busy week here in Cape Verde class. In French we have been learning about transport and how to say different modes of transport in French. We have been working in our new maths groups and have been working out equivalent fractions.

Cape Verde Class have also had the opportunity to explore their own personal interest, these included things like coding and languages. In P.E we've been practicing our football skills. This week Cape Verde class presented an assembly to the rest of the key stage, as it was Remembrance Day, we presented about the meaning of Remembrance Day and the history behind it. In history we are starting to write biographies, so students have been researching a celebrity or famous person of their choice to start a biography about their life and achievements.

Madagascar class

Madagascar class have had a great week this week.

We have been learning about the UK in Geography.

We found out the name of the countries, the capital cities and the seas and rivers in the UK.

We used atlases to support this.

In music we have learning about pulse.

We used our class instruments to find pulse in different types of music. On Friday we looked at Remembrance Day, we took part in a minute's silence to remember the service men and women who lost their lives for our country.

Well done Madagascar for being so respectful.

Kenya class

This week Kenya, completed the following activities:

In English, the students have focused on identifying the senses and onomatopoeia in their work. In Maths we have continued to look at fractions. For RE, the pupils learned about the different features of a church and the work the church does in the community. And finally, for computing, the class looked at the definition of IT and how different jobs use different types of technology.

As always well-done Kenya for all your hard work!

Seychelles class

This week, Seychelles completed activities based around the poem "The Hobbit".

The students created two poems, one based around the Hobbit and his features and way of living. The other was based around the battles the Hobbits were involved in. For science, the students looked at the different ways to protect our environment.

Brazil class

This week Brazil class have learnt all about Remembrance Day, we have written thank you cards to the soldiers for fighting in the war for us.

We also made four Poppies using different materials and different colours, we have learnt what the different colour Poppies represent. In Science this week we conducted an experiment testing the impact different objects made when gravity was pulling them down. Well done Brazil class!

Botswana class

This week in Botswana we have been very busy.

In PE this week we have continued to practice our football skills. We have continued doing drills with our qualified football coach. The students have been trying really hard and they are visible showing lots of progress. In English this week the students have been writing their own poems based on the poetry and songs found in The Hobbit.

This week we celebrated world science day. Our class focus on the environment, investigating the effects of recycling on the planet.

We also celebrated Remembrance Day. We're all very proud of the reflection that the students made as well as the level of respect that they showed. The students really enjoyed the staff dressing up in replica uniforms as well as interacting with WWI artefacts.

The students have also continued studying the map of the UK, learning about the different counties.

Peru class

This week has been a super busy week in Peru class. We started a new topic in science looking at forces. All the students really enjoyed carrying out an experiment dropping objects into trays of flour and measuring the craters. In English we have continued studying 'Macbeth' focusing on the witches' poem.

We practiced reciting the poem in class and looked at the structure of the text. We wrote our own versions of the spell focusing on rhyming couplets.














Key Stage 4

Australia class

Australia class have had a brilliant week filled with new experiences, knowledge and learning.

Our week began with several of our students visiting a potential work experience opportunity on Monday afternoon. Students with an interest in the arts visited the 'Quirky Quarter' where they received a tour of the site and learnt all about optical illusions.

Throughout the week we have enhanced our knowledge and skills in Math's, English and Science. Particularly looking at solving problems with integers in Math's by refining our addition, subtraction, multiplication and division skills. In English, we focused on an extract from "From a railway carriage" and continued to work on the IEC method. In Science, we resumed our topic of the Human Body but focused especially on Gas exchange and the respiratory system – delving into what function each organ serves and why the system would be unable to function without certain elements.

During PE, we evolved our knowledge from last week and learnt how to pass the ball whilst running. This skill was developed in line with the game rules and students were encouraged to create their own comfortable running style.

In terms of Food Tech, we learnt another 'quick meal', which this week was 'Scrambled eggs and oatcakes'. The students thoroughly enjoyed creating this quick dish and there were rave reviews all round.

New Zealand class

This week New Zealand class have been looking at fractions in maths. And we have also been looking at the cardiovascular system in Science looking at blood types and functions of the heart.

Tasmania class

Tasmania has had a busy week this week!

In English we continued focussing on developing our comprehension skills through reading an extract from the 19th-century novel, 'Around the World in 80 days' by Jules Verne. We familiarised ourselves with making inferences and using the SQI method when answering comprehension questions.

In Maths, we recapped on our multiplication tables, odd and even numbers though playing games. We used counters to help us find factors and multiples for different numbers.


In Science, we investigated on how exercises can affect our heart rate. We made a prediction before carrying out the investigation. We counted our pulse in the unit of BPM before and after exercising. We then work out the differences between the two readings.

In ICT we identified a range of tasks that various applications can commonly be used to perform, includes Microsoft Word, Microsoft PowerPoint, Microsoft Excel, Browser, Photoshop, Zoom and Discord. We enjoy discussing how we use the applications at home and shared what we already know about the applications.

In Food Tech, we made oatcake with scrambled eggs. We worked as a team helping each other while following the recipe with staff support. As a class, we helped each other to ensure that the kitchen is cleaned after our lesson.

On Thursday, we took part on World Science Day. The topic we were given was Medicine. We looked at the differences between ancient and modern medicine and discussed on how medicine has advanced which is reflected by people's increased life span. We made our own charm bags (with a variety of herbs in) which people from the Medieval times carried as they believed that these bags had healing or protective properties.













Key Stage 5

Malawi class

This week has been great for Malawi class!! We have had a busy week with exam re-sits and new learning.

In English this week we have looked at key words and broadening our vocabulary with new vocabulary. We have also continued to read and enjoy our class book survivor.

In maths, the focus has been the area of parallelograms and triangles. the class also started a new topic of algebra at the end of the week which the class have done really well with.

In science, the main focus has been atoms and atomic structure which can be really difficult but this week Malawi class have done amazing in this topic.

In food technology this week, students made a tasty cottage pie!!

On a whole, this week has been brilliant and very successful week in Malawi class, well done everyone!!

Papua New Guinea class

PNG class, please give yourselves a huge pat on the back. This week you have truly surpassed yourselves. The work on Remembrance Sunday alone has been outstanding. We have made a collaborative "poppy art" picture and students were tasked on finding an inspirational quote from WW1.

We have looked at the various colours now used to represent different "fallen heroes" in relation to Poppies.

We have also produced some lovely WW1 acrostic poems. For PE, we are looking at the routine a typical soldier would have used in WW1.

Well done again everyone.

Christmas Island class

This has been a great week for Christmas Island class. In PSHE students discussed the concept of charities and completed brainstorming task in pairs to list charities they are aware of. Next, the class completed a matching task as a group - linking charities to their aims.

Students then made power point presentations about their chosen charity to show their research on how it started/what it does/examples of work it has done.

In Science students recapped content from the last two lessons exploring parts of the atom, atomic number, atomic mass, charge with a group discussion and a short video.

Next students were shown diagrams of hydrogen and helium atoms and discussed atomic mass in relation to these examples - which one has more mass?

Students drew these diagrams and wrote down definitions of key terms.


In employability Christmas Islands looked at the idea of enterprise, both class and independent, they brainstormed different ideas and inventions that they could create to raise money for commercial use i.e muscle rubs, sprays or jewellery clasp openers.

They also focused on items that would raise money for charity, including a charity football jersey and sock sales. In food tech the class made a homemade cottage pie, and in accredited food tech lesson they made French toast. In Geography accredited learning our student's explored different countries in the world and what they are known for including food, their flag, and customs.


