### Message from the Headteacher

Dear Students, Families, Colleagues and Friends

Welcome to this year's eleventh week's newsletter. I hope you enjoy reading it and seeing some lovely pictures of our students' experiences.

For me as the school's Headteacher, it is a bitter-sweet week; on the one hand, we heard from yesterday's announcement that £2.3 billion of "new money" will be added to the schools' budget. This is, undoubtedly, great news. Every little helps! I should therefore be rejoicing in the fact that the financial pressures are gone and we can all focus on education.

Sadly, despite those additional funds, the impact on special schools, and our school within those, is less positive. In fact, the figures released for Liverpool special schools for the next financial year show that the additional funding will not help much at all, with significantly less money being granted to Abbot's Lea than we anticipated or were led to believe we would be getting.

Added to that worry is the fact that the latest council proposals to address SEND Sufficiency, do not, in any way, help us as a school create more capacity or resolve the fact that we have been operating at 120% admissions for a number of years. In such situations, as the Headteacher, I worry a lot.

But "just" worrying never changes things for the better. Action is needed and I am hoping you will all join me in a response to today's LCC Cabinet which agreed to launch a public consultation into SEND Sufficiency options of:

- Creating a Bankview South at Parklands
- Building brand new school for Princes
- Expanding Palmerston (by re-opening its old site at the bottom of our road).

As you can see – there is no mention of how to assist Abbot's Lea School in its ongoing capacity issues. Perhaps, by speaking up together, we can help our city leaders see that our students too deserve and need more?

This week in Kenya the class completed the following activities:

In English, we have explored other poetic devices and such as personification. In Maths, students have continued to look at the differences between a half, quarter and a third.

For Science, pupils used newton meters to test out which surfaces have low and high friction rates. And finally, for RE we have looked at all types of churches around the world and researched key facts about seven different churches.

## Key Stage 4

### Australia class

Australia class have had an amazing week this week.

Our year 11 students have shown such determination and perseverance whilst completing their mock exams. Whilst our year 10 students joined other classes during the exams to complete a variety of investigations. Those students worked together to combine their accumulated maths knowledge and skills to complete the investigations and give reasoning for their conclusions.

Away from the mock exams, Australia class have continued to develop their knowledge. Students began to develop a crime story in English, focusing particularly on what makes a great story and discussing particular elements including what setting their story would have, what crime would be committed and a resolution to their problem. During ICT the students enhanced their ability to use Microsoft Excel by completing multi - step worksheets that encouraged the students to insert formulas and edit cells. Australia class also continued to develop their physical ability during PE as they learnt how to safely tackle their opponent during Rugby. This linked closely to our science lessons in which we learnt all about what happens when our bodies inhale oxygen and where the oxygen goes.

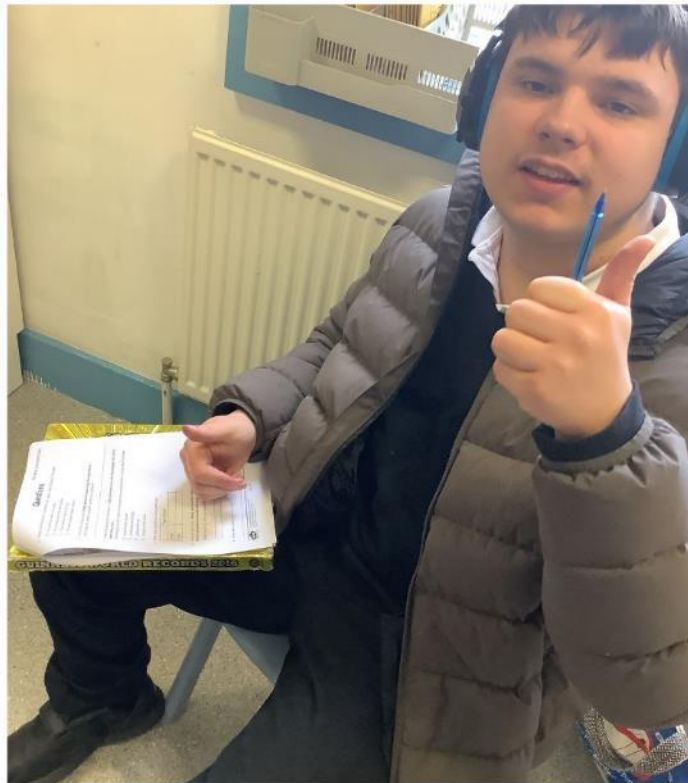
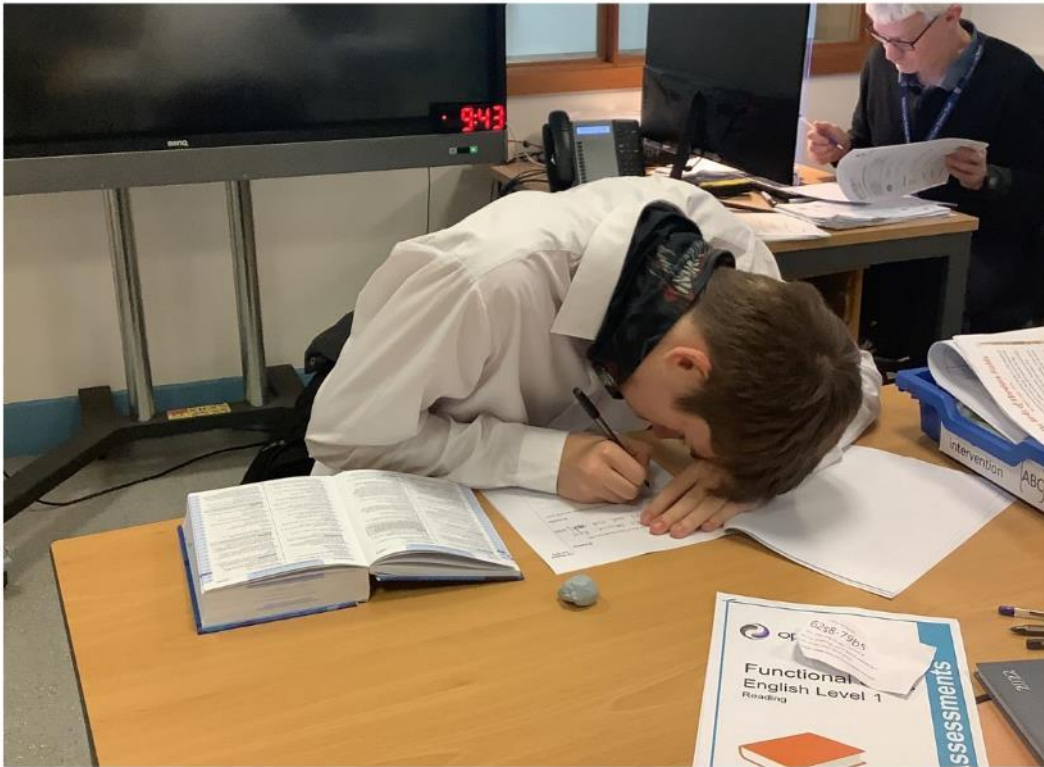
