Ireland class

Ireland class have had a wonderful term 4, learning all about buildings, structures and materials. Through our stories we have explored materials, journeys, friendships, emotions and math language and concepts. We began term 4 by reading 'The Three Little Pigs' a traditional tale where students learnt about the best materials for building a house, especially if you want it to withstand heavy winds and the big bad wolf! Using puppets, props and a range of materials, the students developed their story telling and construction skills. Students developed their language by using words and phrases they remembered from the story as well as using communication boards to request and comment on their play. Adults supported students to use this by modelling words and actions while narrating the students play.

This term we were very active in our PE lessons where students were developing their ball skills and hand/eye coordination. Students used a range of equipment included large and small, hard and soft balls, tennis rackets, benches to travel on and targets to aim for throughout the term.

In music we had the pleasure of working with Chris from 'Music now.' Each week the students became more familiar with the routine, they waited for their turn during the hello song and took turns to play with the instruments, developing their composing skills. Thanks Chris! Everyone has worked really hard to recognise familiar print including their own name, with some matching letters and others developing their letter formations by over writing and writing independently each morning.

With Easter around the corner, this last week has included many Easter themed activities including 'the importance of Easter' engaging in Easter and Spring stories and learning about the signs of spring.

We hope our students and their families have a well-deserved and restful Easter break and look forward to Term 5 when the students will be exploring all things safari!

Wales class



This term Wales Class have been extremely busy. Earlier in the month the students enjoyed celebrating 'World Book Day' with numerous children choosing to dress up as their favourite book character. As well as many others we had "Thing Two", "The Gruffalo" and lots of puppies from "101 Dalmatians" (Wales Class Team) in Wales Class that day instead of the usual cohort. The class started the day by completing self-portraits celebrating their differences as the theme for this year's 'World Book Day' was 'diversity' and then they engaged in an Expressive Arts activity and made 'Dalmatian' masks following viewing a short extract of the story.

Wales Class have hosted another class assembly for the Primary Department to enjoy this term. This time our assembly focused on our learning experiences in Science as it was around the time of 'British Science Week', the theme for this year was 'connections'. In Wales Class we connected the pupils' science activities to one of their favourite Nursery Rhymes 'Humpty Dumpty'. Every pupil used their creative skills to decorate an egg to represent the character of 'Humpty Dumpty'. These eggs were then used as part of an experiment to find out which surface was the safest for 'Humpty' to land on. The students tested a range of surfaces including: cotton wool, cubes, wooden blocks, straw, baked beans and an impromptu test was made of the classroom floor too! We found out that generally 'Humpty' stayed intact when he landed on soft objects and he cracked and consequently broke when he landed on hard objects. As part of this project Wales Class worked on their fine motor skills too by learning how to open and apply plasters to help put a cut-up paper template of 'Humpty' back together again.

The pupils have thoroughly enjoyed our latest topic "Build It Up" and their engagement with activities related to this theme has been superb! We have explored buildings that are familiar to us, such as our homes, and developed our fine motor skills and learnt about giving meaning to our marks when learning to draw these. We have shared traditional stories with a building theme such as "Three Billy

Goats Gruff" and the "Three Little Pigs" and explored retelling these stories with lots of props in our tuff tray. A highlight being getting to blow the pigs' houses down! In addition, the class explored what they could do with an empty cardboard box and ideas included: rowing, driving and hiding from the staff team! They developed their understanding of joining materials together when we frequently had to use tape to put the much-used box back together again. In order to construct safely and effectively the pupils have experienced dressing up in Hi-Vis jackets and hard hats to build with a range of materials and they have constructed lots and lots of things from tall towers to wobbly bridges.

This term we have introduced regular 'Dough Disco' and 'Squiggling' sessions which are proving popular with the pupils, they have focused on creating the movements needed to make the long ladder letter shapes with their arms and ribbon sticks. In Mathematics the students have developed their knowledge and understanding of the numbers 6-10 and they have continued to work on their counting skills too. As part of our learning about height and length the children experienced being measured and created a range of snakes of various lengths from playdough.

We have finished off the term this week engaging in lots of fun Easter-related crafts and look ahead to continuing our learning around the season of Spring when we return to school. The Wales Class Team hope that all the students and their families have a wonderful, restful Easter break and we look forward to seeing the pupils back in school again on Monday 17th April 2023. Happy Easter!

Italy class

As we come to the close of Term 4, we would like to extend our heartfelt appreciation for your support and valuable feedback.

Throughout the term, Italy Class has been immersed in a plethora of exciting and engaging activities. We started the term with a unit on Fair Trade, where the children created their own farms and explored the concept of ethical trade. We also celebrated Pancake Day by making our own pancakes in class and delving into the origins of cocoa and the process of chocolate making.

In honour of World Wildlife Day, the children had an opportunity to create their own wildlife footprints and practiced their stamping using potatoes, a fun and interactive activity that helped foster an appreciation for nature. Additionally, the children enjoyed swimming this term, and we are thrilled to report that every child in Italy Class had a fantastic time.

Next, we celebrated the Holi festival by making our own colourful powder with chalk and creating handprints in class, which was a fun and exciting way to learn about this important cultural event. The children also participated in National Science Week, where they created their own chemical reactions using coloured lemon juice and baking soda and learned about the ground-breaking research being conducted by Mrs. Leyland's scientist friend, Dr. Joanna.

As part of our efforts to promote cultural awareness and understanding, the children celebrated Ramadan by making Ramadan cards for their friends around school and engaging in acts of kindness to help others. This week, we explored Easter around the world by creating our own kites and flying them like they do in Bermuda, which was a unique and memorable experience for all.

Our music lessons this term were led by Mr. Chris from Live Music, who taught the children how to play various instruments. The children loved listening to his euphonium, even if they were still calling it a trumpet! We also completed lovely sessions with Mrs. Smith SALT, where the children enjoyed different roles in Lego therapy. In the school's sensory clinic, Miss Connolly OT provided the children with wonderful sessions every Thursday.

Finally, in outdoor learning, we made the most of the snow by creating snowmen, having a snowball fight, and sledding. We also looked for signs of spring and planted our own snowdrops with the help of Anna, our horticultural specialist.

It has been a truly wonderful term, and we cannot believe how quickly this year is going by. We look forward to welcoming the children back for Term 5 and to continuing our journey of learning and discovery together.

Portugal class



Portugal Class have had a fantastic term and we are very proud of how well the students have worked! We started the term with a busy two-week block of swimming and the students did brilliant listening skills to the instructors and developed their confidence in the water, they did amazing! We also celebrated two student birthdays this term and celebrated in the afternoon with a little party in class.

In English, we started our unit of Traditional Fairy tales where the students have enjoyed listening, sequencing and re-telling the story of Little Red Riding Hood. We also focused on exploring what adjectives are and worked brilliantly to think of our own to describe different characters within the story. We then ended the unit of work to think of alternative endings for the story where we heard some very creative endings!

We have explored a range of religions in Religious Education and Collective Reflection such as Ramadan and Easter and explored their different beliefs and cultures. We sequenced the Easter story, made menorah candelabra and really enjoyed a trip to a local Church to identify different features of a Christian Church. We had so much fun!

We enjoyed a trip to Gillmoss Recycling Discovery Centre where the students got to see how and where our recycling goes and they followed instructions excellently and listened to the centre's staff. They also enjoyed exploring the opportunities within careers by seeing the centre people at work in educational areas and recycling machinery.

In Maths we have been comparing and measuring heights and lengths. We have completed a lot of sensory and hands on activities which the students enjoyed, and students were challenged to use a ruler to read metric units. They started to use centimetres and enjoyed comparing and measuring different objects around the classroom. This was such a wow moment as students really grasped onto the concept of different units when we measure objects!

In Music, students really wowed the teachers by showing musical rhythm and using hand bells to follow along to popular songs. The songs were played beautifully and they thoroughly enjoyed playing the bells along to Moana songs and Africa!

In Science, we have focused on different plants and learned all about the different life cycles of different flowers and plants.

In PSHE we have focused on the unit of Digital wellbeing which looked at how to stay safe online. Wow moments were made when students could identify what is personal information and could recognise we shouldn't share it to strangers or anywhere when using the internet. We made posters on how to stay safe online and posters on how to live a balanced lifestyle whilst using technology.

Overall, it has been a fantastic term and we are so proud of Portugal Class' resilience and they have really worked so hard! There have been many 'WOW' moments which we have celebrated daily and we hope everyone has a wonderful half term!



Spain class



It has been a jam-packed, fun filled few weeks in Spain class this term. Our first week back was Fairtrade week, and we learnt all about what it means and products that can be Fairtrade. We used Fairtrade chocolate to make edible playdoh and rice krispie cakes and Fairtrade bananas to make banana bread. In art, we used Fairtrade coffee in an unusual way, and instead of drinking it, we painted it, and we created the Fairtrade logo using paper plates, paint, and tissue paper. We were very artistic and made lots of beautiful artwork, we designed our own chocolate bars and wrappers and took inspiration from still life paintings and painted fruit bowls. We listened to a rainy-day sensory story and made rain cloud sensory jars using shaving foam and blue food colouring. Our trip this week was a minibus journey to see Fairtrade food shops and cafes. On our journey, we saw a cafe that even had their own animals.

Our second week back was World Wildlife Week, and we learnt about lots of different animals. We took inspiration from what we learnt and created lots of beautiful artwork. We made sea turtles using tissue paper and paper plates, textured hedgehogs using leaves we collected from around school, and printed on birds using cotton wool and feathers. On World Book Day, we made bookmarks and went on a bus journey to see libraries in Liverpool.

Week three was very colourful in Spain class as we learnt all about Holi Festival. We got very creative and worked together to make a rainbow out of all our handprints, we designed bright t-shirts and learnt about symmetry by painting symmetrical pictures. We explored using different materials and feeling different textures and made bright colourful trees using tissue and crepe paper. We experimented with different ways of creating artwork by using straws and paint to make beautiful patterns across the page.

Week four was a short week but was very fun for us as it was when we all managed to go swimming. This was very exciting as for some of us it was the first time we had ever been in or even to the swimming pool. Week four was also when we showed appreciation for our mums and made Mother's Day cards.

Week five was a very exciting week for us as we invited the lovely Miss Sloan, who will be joining us as our class teacher after Easter, into Spain class. This week we were learning all about Ramadan and how it's celebrated. We learnt why it's such an important time for some Muslims and how it's observed all over the world, we made sun catcher lanterns and Mehndi hand patterns, which are a traditional form of body art used to celebrate important occasions. 20th March was World Frog Day and we learnt all about Frogs, why they are important and how we can conserve these fascinating creatures.

For World Music Day on the 21st we had lots of fun exploring different types of instruments and even made our own musical shakers using dried pasta, rice, and sequins.

Our last week was all about Easter, we listened to the Easter story and learnt why it is an important festival for Christians, we made silhouettes of a cross on a hill using sponges to create the sunset and adding a black outline. We had lots of fun making animals we see in Spring using all kinds of different materials. We used cotton wool to make lambs, tissue paper to make chicks and our hands to make bunnies. Our favourite part was our Easter egg scavenger hunt in the adventure playground where we had to be on the lookout for special golden eggs.

We hope everyone had a lovely, restful Easter holidays and we look forward to seeing everyone next term.

France class



With that Term 4 has now ended and what an amazing term it has been for France Class. All the students have worked incredibly hard this term and should be very proud of themselves. All of France Class showed amazing resilience this term with the many changes in routine that came and showed fantastic dedication to completing activities set.

France Class started off this term with two weeks of amazing swimming sessions. All students pushed themselves out of their comfort zones and loved their sessions! Some students overcame personal challenges and pushed themselves to learn new skills within the pool and also outside the pool whether that be on the bus, next to the pool or in any transitions.

We began learning about Fair Trade and its impact upon the world, with students learning about different resources that come from all around the world and the way Fair Trade helps to support different communities and ensure everyone has the ability to succeed in their job opportunities. This was supported with the idea of wind power and using streamers and windmills to see the impact the weather can have. We

celebrated pancake day by enjoying some freshly made pancakes and covered them with our favourite toppings.

Then we developed our knowledge of animal's adaptations and how they have evolved to survive within different habitats such as the Arctic, the jungle, the city and the countryside. We learnt about animals in the sky, sea, land and the different ways evolution has allowed them to thrive within their habitats. We even learnt about long forgotten animals such as the Triceratops, Velociraptor and the ancient giants of the sea.

Next, France Class learnt about Holi and the impact of celebration upon a community. We took a more practical approach to the learning this week as we made some balloon smash art and made some amazing art work. We also tried lots of new foods from India and listed what we liked and did not like. This allowed us to try new items but also to say how we felt about it and why we felt that way. Finally, this week we celebrated Mother's Day and celebrated the special women in our families by creating cards for them and discussing what we were grateful for from our families.

For PE this term we have continued to enjoy building up our gymnastic skills and worked on our balancing ability to follow a routine and ability to continue to build our core skills and motor skills. We enjoyed some fun games of Balloon Volleyball and this allowed us to practice our turn taking, ability to work as a team and also to be able to catch and throw to one another. With the weather becoming a bit warmer and brighter we were able to take our PE lessons outdoors and enjoy the Sun.

France Class looked at the celebration of Ramadan and they were amazing! France class designed their own henna hands, Mosques, Prayer mats and sun catchers to decorate the classroom with. Franc Class learnt key terminology from the Islam religion and were even able to greet each other in Arabic. We finished by creating our own firework display in the classroom similar to that at the end of Ramadan. France Class also tried some traditional Arabic food including dates, hummus, and traditional breads

Finally, France Class learnt all about Easter and were able to create and eat some yummy traditional Easter treats such as hot cross buns, Easter eggs and marshmallows!!We all loved them. We were also able to learn the story of Easter and create fantastic items such as 2D shape chicks and bunnys, playing an Easter I Spy and Easter Cards for our family.

Canada class

Canada class have had a fantastic half term of creative learning. In English we have all joined in with a "guided read" using the book Mr Stink by David Walliams, We have enjoyed exploring the characters and some of the main themes in the book. We are developing our reading styles and confidence in reading aloud to a small group.

In maths we have been learning about fractions – we have used lots of practical equipment to enhance our understanding of what can be a tricky topic in maths. We have also worked hard during our data collection topic in maths. We have learned how to create graphs, pictograms and bar charts. We have gathered data and interpreted the various data to answer questions.

In science we have learnt about plants in particular the correct environments for plants to thrive. We have made predictions and completed a fair test by planting seeds in different conditions. For example we have placed some in daylight, some in the dark, with water and without water. Our seeds have all grown really well – we will keep you posted how they continue to do.

As part of our R.E lessons we have been learning about different religions. We have looked at special places of worship, special books and the names of leaders within each religion. We have used a Kahoot quiz to consolidate our learning in this subject.

We have continued to enjoy working with the LFC foundation as part of our P.E lessons. This half term we have learned how to play bench ball. We have focused on team work and tactics to support this.

Canada class have been lucky to work closely with Chris from Live Music. We are currently writing a song about school and will hope to put music with this. We have made use of the music hut to play the drums and glockenspiels.

We have enjoyed two class trips this half term. One to the recycling plant where we were able to see how the factory works. We also made great use of the exploration room, learning lots of new facts about which items can be recycled. We also took part in an Autism Awareness walk at Stanley Park, organised by the LFC foundation. We hope you all have a lovely and restful Easter and look forward to seeing you next half term. 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USA class



This term has flown by! Our students have all worked exceptionally hard and have made progress with their academic, social and emotional skills.

For R.E this term we have continued learning about Places of Worship. Our students have engaged well in this topic and can explain why a place of worship is important to a faith community. To further consolidate learning, we visited a church within our local community and identified the different areas and religious artefacts.

For Science this term we have been learning about what plants need to grow. As part of our learning, we have completed an experiment to see what a plant needs to stay healthy. The students planted sunflower seeds at the beginning of the term and gave each of them different things. One plant had water and sunlight, another had water and no sunlight and the final plant had no water or sunlight. The students have thoroughly enjoyed monitoring our plants over the last six weeks and can confidentially say what a healthy plant needs to grow.

In Life Skills this term we have focused on the important topic of Digital Well-being. To begin this topic we discussed how to stay safe online and the importance of keeping our personal information private. This term in Seychelles we have investigated rivers in Geography, looked at the evolution of species in Science and learned about history's hidden figures through our targeted diversity days.

The most enjoyable moment for staff this term was the responses children gave in relation to our PSHE topic 'Investigating Our Autistic Minds'. We watched Autistic role-models talk openly and honestly about their struggles with Autism. Many of our children connected with the topic and shared openly and honestly their own struggles of living in a world which they feel is not designed for them to thrive. Sharing their thoughts and feelings as a group has allowed the children to talk more honestly in their free time about themselves and in turn, create their own support networks within school.

In Design Technology, we attempted to make a large marble run and in English we investigated persuasive writing techniques. In groups, the children created their own Dragon's Den style pitch using Microsoft PowerPoint to try and persuade the teaching staff to invest in their inventions. There were some incredibly imaginative ideas and some great arguments put forward. The confidence shown when the children were presenting their ideas was fantastic to watch.

Madagascar class



Madagascar class have had a great term. All the students have worked really hard in all their lessons. All the staff are so proud of what they have achieved this term.

In English, we have been reading The Twits by Roald Dahl. We described the characters from the story and predicted what would happen next. The students really enjoyed reading about the tricks that Mr and Mrs Twit played on each other. In our class assembly, two students acted out Mrs Twit feeding Mr Twit wormy spaghetti.

In maths, Madagascar set students have engaged in

lessons from the following topics. Number –addition and subtraction, Geometry - shape. The maths set of students have worked really well together and are making fantastic progress in their set group.

In science, we have studied Inheritance and Evolution, the students shared with each other, what characteristics and physical features they inherited from their parents. We also studied the life of Charles Darwin and what he found when exploring the Galapagos Islands.

In music, we have been learning to play different notes on the glockenspiels. We performed pieces of music using a range of notes. In PSHE, we have studied One World. We talked about the life of Chiwa; a young girl aged 9, who lives in a small village in Malawi. Each student gave valid contributions to our discussions, about her dilemma, about wanting to attend school.

In computing, we have looked at Handling Data. We used Purple Mash software to create spreadsheets, count and calculate amounts.

In French, we have studied About Town. We used the atlases to locate different French towns and found out about the local area. The students are enjoying learning a new language.

In geography, we have been studying Rivers. We located rivers in the UK, and found the river source and river mouth. We identified different courses, tributaries and studied erosion and deposition. A fascinating topic to study!

In PE, we have been playing Basketball. We practised the skills involved in playing a game; dribbling, throwing and catching and how to defend and attack.

In RE, we have studied Islam. We learnt about the life of Mohammed and why Mecca is such a special place to Muslims.

Well done Madagascar students! We have had a great term 4. Have a lovely break with your families and staff look forward to welcoming you back to class on Monday 17th April.

Term 5 will be an exciting one. We are due to go swimming from Tuesday 2nd May for 2 weeks. More information will be sent home to parents after the Easter holidays.

This term may have been short but yet it has been busy and fulfilling for Kenya class. We have taken part in various and interesting activities with students putting in lots of effort and hard work.

With that being said, here is what we have been up to in the following subjects:

Firstly, in English we have been focusing on improving our creative writing skills in the form of short stories. Students have looked at the structure of a short story such as descriptions of a character and the inclusion of a conflict and resolution. Once, the pupils felt secure with this, the class created their own short story using inspiration from the Mr Men book series.

Next, in Geography we have been studying the topic of rivers in particular how they are formed and how do they contribute to wider society. Kenya class found that rivers have many uses whether that be as a source of renewable energy or a way of providing transport and job opportunities for people.

For Science, we have researched the theory of evolution and inheritance by Charles Darwin. We first started with identifying what we as humans have inherited from our parents and then went on to look at how animals have adapted to suit their environment. Finally, we looked at the impact humans have on the evolution of animals and plants. Sadly, students came to the agreement that the impact of humans has affected the evolution of animals in a negative way so much so it has contributed to the endangerment of particular animals.

In French, Kenya class have moved on to being able to talk about routines particularly focusing on a person's daily routine. This ranged from learning to say and write down 'I wake up' in French to 'I eat dinner'. Once students began to recognise these phrases, students then were able to create a comic strip writing down key phrases of their own daily routine.

This terms theme for PE has been learning to use different passes and techniques in Basketball. Examples of these were improving our dribbling skills, chest passes and bounce passes. Using these skills, Kenya class were able to take part in basketball games against other classes. This proved an important lesson as not only did the pupils learn new skills it was vital in terms of helping them to work as a team with their classmates.

Additionally, in Computing pupils have used the software programme 'Purple Mash' to learn how to input data from a table into a bar or pie chart. For example, as a class, we looked at the most popular flavoured crisps. Surprisingly, salt and vinegar flavoured crisps came out top!

Again, Fridays have been an important day to Kenya class as we have been able to discuss sensitive but important issues in collective reflection and PSHE. Key examples of these have been researching how we can live more sustainably and highlighting the importance of Neurodiversity.

Apart from subject based learning, Kenya class have also had noteworthy opportunities outside the classroom. For two weeks, pupils visited Halewood Leisure Centre to take part in swimming lessons in order to improve key swimming strokes such as front crawl, backstroke, breaststroke and the butterfly. As well as this, as it has been 'National Careers weeks' pupils have seen members of staff be interviewed about the job they have now at Abbot's Lea and what skills have been transferable

from previous job roles. Similarly, Kenya class were able to speak with local police officers about the many different types of careers you can have in the police force and what it entails.

Australia class



Australia class have had a fantastic term and have really earnt a well-deserved break!

Our students have worked so hard this term, especially in their core subjects where students have been challenged with new topics and levels of understanding. During our English lessons, students have focused predominantly on improving their spelling, punctuation and grammar (SPAG) with particular focus on reading varying extracts and analysing what they can infer from various texts. Students were challenged with answering questions each lesson, focusing closely on their SPAG and improving their

answers when appropriate. During maths, we have looked at calculating percentages and how being able to do that could be useful when the students leave school. In terms of Science, we began our new topic 'Exploring our Universe' this term. Students have learnt all about our solar system and even created some models. A particularly great example of one of the models, created by Nathaniel and Alex is displayed on the KS4 twitter account!

A class favourite of ours is definitely Monday morning Food Technology lessons. This term we have created a variety of baked goods including Apple and Sultana Crumble, Herby Veggie Crumble, Banana Muffins and an unexpected winning dish, Lamb Crumble. Students were hesitant to create the Lamb Crumble but upon taste testing were pleasantly surprised at how tasty it was. The majority of the class even returned for seconds! It just goes to show, as the saying goes, never judge a book by its cover!

During PE, Australia class combined with New Zealand each week to learn all about football. Students developed their ability to pass and travel with the ball, as well as learning how to tackle safely for the ball and shoot successfully. Students experienced utilising those skills in a game setting each week and we couldn't be any prouder of those who took part. Some of our students really stepped out of their comfort zone to join in and it hasn't gone unnoticed!

This term also marked the first time our year 11's sat mock exams in a formal setting in the school hall. New Zealand class

We looked at the book "Danny Champion of the World" by Roald Dahl this term, focusing on the theme of growing up and the differences in "the classes". For Science we have been studying our solar system, finding out about the different planets, their place in the solar system and their features, orbits and about how the earth's axis effects the seasons throughout the year.

So much progress has been made this year and it has been so lovely to watch the students in Samoa grow and mature every day.





Tasmania class

Tasmania has had a busy term and all students worked extremely hard. A big well done to all!

In English, we worked on securing skills of inference with 19th century novel by reading an extract from 'What Katy Did (1872)' by Susan Coolidge. We used the semantic web to help us remember key vocabulary from the extract. We practised using the SQI model to answer comprehension questions. We also explored 19th century poetry by reading 'I Remember, I Remember (1827)' by Thomas Hood. We used images to help us describe the author's childhood. We read a 19th century non-fiction 'A Fearful State of Things in South Lambeth: Roughs Rule the Roost (1898)' and analysed the features of the characters and discussed on stereotype. On World Book Day we read 'Malala's magic pencil' and wrote our own version of magic pencil.

In Maths, we learned more about fractions and decimals. The topics that we had covered so far are:

- equivalent fractions
- recognising tenths and hundredths
- converting tenths into decimals
- placing tenths on a number line and on a place value grid
- placing decimal numbers on a number line
- recognising hundredths
- converting hundredths into decimals
- representing hundredths on a place value grid
- dividing 1 and 2 digits by a hundred and making a whole with tenths and hundredths.

In Science, we learned about water pollution and conservation. We identified different types of renewable and non-renewable energy. We learned about the difference between a planet, a moon, a sun and a star. We created our own models to show how the earth moves around the sun. We learned about how days, nights and the seasons are created in relation to how the earth, moon and sun orbit. Tasmania class also made up our own version of mnemonic to help us remember the order of the planets in our solar system – My Very Elegant Mother Just Served Us Noodles.

In PSHE, we discussed about what the short- and long-term effects are of using drugs and alcohol among young people. We also discussed about the risks for an individual and wider society. We learned about the different types of criminal exploitation, the risks involved and the support we can get. We did a quiz on online safety. We explored on the benefits and risks of gambling. We also learned about first aid including primary survey and the recovery position. We looked at safety hazards in our daily life. In Employability, following Gatsby Benchmarks, we learned more about customer service and discussed on the qualities of good customer service. In RE, we reflected on what would we like to be in the future. We also looked at Nowruz and discussed about what we were looking forward to in our lives.

In Food Tech, we have worked together and made pancake, crumble top muffins, lamb crumble and soda bread. In PE, we have been practising on football this term. We learned about passing and shooting. We had small matches to practise our football skills.

KS5 students took part in mock exams this term, as their exams are approaching next term. Malawi class students all completed their exams in perfect exam conditions to mimic the process of their real exams. Students gave the exams their all and the class team are super proud of everyone!!

In terms of learning this term, there has been lots of it!! In English, the class have been reading the class read Thirteen by Tom Hoyle. The class have been hooked onto this book with the many cliffhangers that it has left us on, left students wanting to read more every time. Within the book, the class have identified different styles of writing, language features, and organisational features and discussed how these have effectively been used within the book. In maths this term, the class have covered a few topics covering number looking at adding subtracting and multiplying decimals and ratio. At SWRAC, the students loved the social area, and enjoyed a game of FIFA, as well as playing table football.

We have also been very fortunate to visit the recycling centre and were given a tour of the centre, looking at the ways in which things are recycled, as well as looking at the things that people put into their recycling bins that they aren't supposed to - for example, garden chairs!

In class-based sessions, we have been working hard on homophones in English, and students have been able to distinguish between many different homophones, such as their, there and they're. In Maths, we have worked on linear sequences, 3D shapes and also on decimal points. The students have been very resilient with these tasks too - well done! In Science, we have looked at the periodic table and Mendeleev. Students have researched Mendeleev and his findings. We have also conducted some science experiments, looking at chemical bonding and creating volcanoes. In Food Tech, we have cooked lots of delicious food, such as flapjack, muffins, cornflake cakes and "Fifteen cakes".

In PSHE, we have been talking about our personal strengths, and watched a documentary about the former England Rugby League player Rob Burrow, and the class were able to identify his personal strengths and characteristics. In Employability, we have focused on hazards in the workplace, looking at hazards signs and then looking at what potential hazards there might be in the workplace, and how to resolve any problems.

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

My name is Michele Ross and I wanted to introduce myself and the team here at Liverpool City Council's Adult Learning Centre. I hope this letter finds you all well and I'm writing to you to give you an update about the activities, services and support that is available for you to access. We can bring family learning courses and activities directly to your venue or we can deliver them at one of our centres.

We have **ESOL** related classes which supports the development of English which could help parents support their child with homework and provide better skills to access work. For example, our English conversation classes. These courses also include trips and visits to local facilities such as libraries and may help you access a range of services within your community.

- Developing a range of skills including maths, IT, and reading & writing English – through weighing ingredients, measuring, smartboard internet research and recipe writing. This can help you with your child's homework
- Exploring next steps and referring learners to our on- site Employment team for career or volunteer advice

Not to worry if your venue doesn't have a kitchen or a classroom as the good news is... at Granby and Newsham we have kitchens and classrooms you can use. We offer a wide range of courses that celebrate our cultures through world foods. This is great for meeting up, cooking, eating, and learning together, and to help you to find out more about the food that we eat, including nutrition and health benefits.















Also, our brilliant **textiles** and **garment** classes run every week with **tutor Mareen** and include sewing, repairs, garment making etc. Lots of people who take the class use this to make their children's clothes and some are now even offering sewing services locally around the Lodge Lane area.
