The final term in Wales Class has been an absolutely brilliant one with lots of new firsts and 'wow' moments taking place including children using the toilet for the first time and using a communication board and other visuals to make their needs and wants known.

At the start of the term we had our final class assembly which focused on 'Child Safety Week'. During the week we explored and practised keeping safe in the sun, learnt about road safety and the children very much enjoyed the opportunity to sit in a real fire-engine when it visited the site.

Our theme for the term has been 'Marvellous Machines' and different types of transport including bus, boats, trains and planes have been explored. The class thoroughly enjoyed hearing the story 'The Naughty Bus' so much so that they have requested it many more times since. Following hearing it we retold the story using sensory resources and the pupils had great fun moving their very own 'Naughty Bus' through baked beans, flowers and blocks representing buildings before finally brushing its 'teeth' and putting it to bed for the night. "Whatever Next" was another story loved by Wales Class.

Linked to our termly theme we have completed lots and lots of arts and crafts activities. We have made footprint vehicles, paper-cup robots and collage rockets to name just a few! The students have also loved moving to music and very much impressed us with their dancing skills. Wales Class have been developing their technology skills by using both iPads and Beebots, both of which they concluded were most definitely a 'Marvellous Machine'! When exploring the Beebots the children were encouraged to use a communication board to help them learn the vocabulary required to program their device.

As part of our learning we have had two trips out in the minibus to spot different types of transport, one to Liverpool Waterfront and the other to the airport viewing area. We got to see the Isle of Man ferry loading, lots and lots of buses and we heard the roar of the planes' engines as they took off.



Portugal class



Portugal Class have had a fantastic, fun-filled and busy term! We have enjoyed a range of topics in different subjects and have celebrated a variety of awareness days and events.

In English, Portugal Class consolidated their knowledge of text routines by exploring the text 'The Ugly Five' by Julia Donaldson. They were able to recognise speech marks, how to use them and identified rhyming words throughout the story! We further explored Julia Donaldson texts by focusing on The Smeds and the Smoos where we made our own playdough-versions of the characters (Janet and Billy), and discovered different themes within the story such as Romance, Racism and Diversity.

Portugal Class have also been enjoying Wellbeing Wednesdays where a new wellbeing superhero is introduced each week, teaching us different strategies to use for different emotions. Our latest wellbeing superhero was Dr Bubbles where we enjoyed using our circle of trust to discuss our worries and blow them into bubbles to pop them away!

In Maths, our focus has been money. Portugal Class have enjoyed a range of play-based and multi-sensory approaches to recognise the different coins, notes and making different amounts using a range of coins. To

develop our turn-taking, we have also enjoyed playing a game around the interactive whiteboard to recognise different coins and make different amounts using a range of coins. We opened our Portugal Class café during snack time where students had to exchange the amount for the snack they wanted, and also enjoyed shop role play to further understand the concept of money and recognise different amounts.

In Phonics, we have enjoyed a focus using technology. In our groups, we have used CHATTA to learn new sounds and to consolidate prior learning. This has been a fantastic way for children to practice recognising different sounds, and develop their blending and segmenting skills.

In PE, we have enjoyed a range of ball games and learned new skills for the sport of Boccia. We did this by learning different throwing techniques, aiming into targets and learning to understand why it is important to warm up before any type of sports.

In Music, we have enjoyed using Chrome Music Lab to experiment and explore with different sounds, rhythms and pulses.

We also became super scientists by exploring our senses and reflexes by guessing different items using our five senses, we designed parachutes for our animal toys and dropped them to make sure they landed safely, and we experimented with noise & sounds by using paper cups and string.

We have really enjoyed a variety of events such as sports day where Portugal class competed in a range of different races. We enjoyed our fun day where we used inflatables to control our balance, and we watched caterpillars transform into butterflies and released them into the school field when they had grown! To end the term, we enjoyed a trip out on the mini bus trip to compare houses built similar to those during The Great Fire of London.

It has been a fantastic year in Portugal Class and we have had the privilege of working with each student this year! We are beyond proud of the progress each student has made and wish them the very best of luck in their new classes. We hope you all have a wonderful summer break!



Spain class



It has been a fantastic term for Spain class, we have progressed so much with our social communication and emotional regulation skills and enjoyed learning lots of new things.

Our first week back after half term was World Environment week and we loved getting outside in the sunshine. We learnt all about pollution and ways in which we can help the environment. We looked at how plastic pollution is affecting our oceans and how global warming is melting the polar ice caps. This week we read The Snail and the Whale and used the different locations in the story to learn more about the environment.

Our second week back was nature photography week and Spain class practiced our photography and technology skills by taking pictures of the world around us. Our book of the week was The Gruffalo and we enjoyed taking part in activities involving the characters from the story. Week 2 was especially exciting for us as we had Sports day and Primary careers day. Spain class practiced good waiting for their events and were fantastic competitors throughout. On primary careers day we loved meeting the real life firefighters and sitting in the fire engine.

Week three was World Rainforest week and we learnt all about the jungle. We explored Rainforest animals and went foraging for Rainforest fruits. We saw what it might be like to live in the Rainforest during a sensory activity and made rainsticks on World Music Day.

Week four, our theme was Black Lives Matter we focused on reading stories set on the continent of Africa. We looked at inspirational black people.

Spain class took their weekly mini bus journey to the Albert Dock and went to see the Nelson Mandela Mural! We loved making our own handprint flowers, and self-portraits out of paper plates, celebrating how different we all are!

Week five was Chocolate Week, Spain class have loved chocolate week! We enjoyed food technology where we made our own chocolate rice crispie cakes! Using our communication boards to mix, melt, and scoop. We explored the smells of our own chocolate playdo, as a class we rolled and squashed the playdo to make chocolate playdo cupcakes. We also loved our chocolate sensory tray with chocolate gloop! Well done Spain class for an amazing week!

This term, Spain class have really developed our social communication and turn taking skills by taking part in structured play sessions. We were introduced to new games such as snap, operation and dominoes. We have enjoyed getting out and about this term on the bus and have seen lots of our beautiful city.

France class



Term 6 has now come to an end for France Class and what an amazing term it has been. This term France Class students have been able to experience and push themselves in so many ways and have all had fantastic Wow moments each week. The France Class Team could not be prouder of each and every single student.

We started our final term learning all about the environments from all around the world and what France Class students could do to support them. We created posters that were proudly shown in the Key Stage 2 corridor discussing ways to keep the world safe including saving water, electricity and looking after the different animals of the world. A major Wow moment happened during our Friday morning recall when each member in the class mentioned a different type of pollution and gave a way to minimise this pollution!

France Class became nature photographers and went on a tour of our local areas and snapped up some amazing shots of Otterspool Promenade, Sefton Park and Calderstones Park. Thankfully all France Class students are technological whizzes and were able to create time lapse videos, collages and some outstanding art work for the classroom, much better than the France Class Team, who were lucky enough to have been given some one-to-one lessons from students to increase our own skills.

Next, we focused on one environment the rainforest. We discussed different layers, plants, animals and habitats that were in the rainforests all over the world and were able to label them on a large chart on France Class wall. We created Henri Rousseau style art work using pastels to create different animal patterns and discussed the life cycle of animals within the rainforest.

France Class were exceptional when we worked on the topic of Black History Week. Students discussed artists, sportspersons and historical figures who throughout their lives had worked hard in the discussion of equality for all. Students learnt about Ruby Bridges, Mary Seacole, Martin Luther King and Louis Armstrong. We explored different cultures through items of clothing, musical instruments and designing our own African prints. We even did a truly memorable rendition to Waka Waka by Shakira lead by one of our own students.

Finally, just before transition week we were able to celebrate one of our favourite weeks, World chocolate week. We learnt all about the journey it takes to create chocolate. Starting with the Cacao Tree in the rainforest, to the shelves in our local supermarket

For food tech this term we were able to create many different culinary surprises and use our skills including slicing, dicing, chopping and measuring. We were able to create jelly, chocolate chip muffins, mixed berry crumble, ice lollies (or lolly ices?) and different chocolate based surprise desserts. We were super proud of two of our students who pushed themselves in each lesson to ensure they tried new foods and even found new foods they enjoyed! We again are so proud of all the students for trying new things each week.

During term 6 we were lucky enough to have Sports Day, a Fun Day, Careers Day and World Music Day. Families were able to join and participate in some of these days and got to see some of France Classes proudest moments supporting one another during some very competitive times. We were also joined by Chris the Music Man who some students struggled with at first, however after some support and conversations all of France Class were able to enjoy some of our favourite songs including a class favourite...Elton John!

The France Class Team would like to say 'good luck' to the students who are moving onto Canada Class, Peru Class and Brazil Class. We are, as mentioned, extremely proud of the hard work and dedication everyone has put in to their academic journey and we thank you for making us cry with laughter every day!



Canada class



Another fantastic term for Canada class! We have worked hard in English looking at non chronological reports. This involved learning new terminology such as heading, sub heading and captions. We then used this newfound knowledge to make our own PowerPoints based on things we love. Our confidence and pride in presenting them to everyone shone through and we all enjoyed the applause.

We have revisited time in maths, all of the pupils in class can now tell the time to the hour and half past. We have moved onto to counting in five-minute intervals and are currently practising this throughout the day. Keep up the time telling at home Canada class!

We all took part in a careers focused day where we learned some first aid, had a visit from the fire brigade including a fire engine. We talked about our hope for the future for jobs and which skills we

need to work on now to achieve these dreams. We presented our class assembly this term based on careers day. We spoke confidently and clearly to the whole of the primary department.

We have had so much fun this term including our fun day with the inflatables and we won a football tournament that we took part in at a school on the Wirral.

It has truly been a fantastic year with so many amazing memories made. Italy class



Week 35 was world environment week. We engaged in many activities learning about the importance of the environment and how we must protect it. We explored and engaged in many different activities ranging from walks around the forest discussing deforestation, playing in the water trays in Italy class garden. The cold water being blue and the hot water being red and the opening of Italy class shop. We went around the classroom performing tasks that would help the environment such as recycling and turning off the lights and switches. We also had sports day! The sun was shining and the atmosphere was so fun, positive yet competitive! We competed in a variety of races, all receiving medals.

Week 37 focused on the rainforest, We drew our own animals that we would expect to see and who lives in the rainforest but not only that we cut and stuck them in one of the four layers they live in the rainforest an example being leaf cutter ants in the forest floor layer. Through a range of activities we learned about the four layers, animals and plants we can find in the rainforest. We created our own individual rainforests in art with card and paper again working on our cutting skills, letting the students work independently choosing their own colours, patterns and animals to live in their forest.

Week 38 was a very important week focusing on Black lives matter. In our Art lesson every student contributed their own part to a mosaic of both Nelson Mandela and Martin Luther King. We also added the letters "BLM" to the mosaic. We introduced music from black origin such as afro beat, reggae and hip hop. The students and staff loved engaging in dance every day this week to the music during our PIT time. Every morning when the students came in there would be a colouring activity ready emphasizing the importance of equality and diversity.

Week 39 was our last week as Italy class. What better way to end the term none other than chocolate day. In Food technology we made our very own Rice Krispie cakes. We firstly snapped the chocolate and put them into a bowl to melt in the microwave. We mixed the Rice Krispies with the chocolate and drizzled with white chocolate and just to add the finishing touch placed a Wispa Bite on top. They were delicious!! Kenya class



It is the last term and though it has been short it has been busy and fulfilling for Kenya class. We have taken part in various and interesting activities with students putting in lots of effort and hard work.

With that being said, here is what we have been up to in the following subjects:

Firstly, in English, we have read as a class, 'The Spook's Apprentice'. With this text, students have analysed key characters, created pieces of descriptive writing and used their inference skills to predict what will happen next in the book. Once, the pupils had read the majority of the novel, they were able to then summarise the main events.

Next, in Geography we have studied the continent of North America. Kenya class found out that within North America there are 23 countries and were able to label them on the map. Using this information, the pupils then focused on particular places and compared their terrain, climate, tourism and population to Liverpool.

For Science, the topic focus has been looking at the body and its functions. For example, students have looked at the importance of the circulatory system in particular the heart and lungs. As well as

this, we have started to learn about the changes that happen to humans throughout key stages of life such as what ages do we learn to walk, talk, grow and how puberty affects the body.

In French, Kenya class have moved on to learning about the different types of transport we can use every day. Students were able to identify the correct images of transports to the corresponding phrases in French.

For Music, the class have listened to different genres of music and have been able to recognise what instruments, the type of pitch and what type tempo has been used within each piece of music. Then, we discussed which style of music we preferred and how did it make us feel.

This terms theme for PE has been learning how to play tennis. The students, have practiced how to hit the ball, think about their foot work and learnt the importance of hand and eye co-ordination. Once again, this type of sport proved vital in terms of helping them to work as a team with their classmates.

Additionally, in DT pupils have examined the mechanisms used in everyday objects and were able to correctly identify if an object used a pulley, gear or a lever. From this, the class explored what mechanisms would be used in a Ferris wheel and then went on to design their own prototype of a Ferris wheel.

Again, Fridays have been an important day to Kenya class as we have been able to discuss sensitive but important issues in collective reflection and PSHE. Key examples of these have been highlighting the pros and cons of social media, how we can stay safe online and how to help others when dealing with issues online.

Apart from subject based learning, Kenya class have also had noteworthy opportunities outside the classroom. For example, the school organised a sports day in which each student took part in at least one activity whether that be shot put, long distance running or welly throwing! Also, Kenya class had the opportunity to have a go on inflatables as part of the school's 'Fun Day'. This was a successful day which all students enjoyed!

Dear Parent or Guardian

The Summer HAF programme starts on the 24th July and there are lots of great activities happening over the school holidays. Children and young people, from reception to age 16 (including year 11 leavers), who are eligible for benefits related free school meals, will be able to access hundreds of activities throughout the summer holidays including specific provision available for children with SEND or additional needs, at no cost. There's a great range of activities across the city including boxing, football, music, dance, cycling, cooking, discos, films, basketball, arts and crafts, drama, bbg's, water games, trips out and much more! Every day there will be a range of fabulous meals available with many schemes holding family events as well.

When you have chosen an activity, you will need to contact that organisation to book a place. Each organisation will have either a telephone number, email address or online booking system. If your child has any additional needs or dietary requirements then please discuss this with the organisation when you book. There is no central booking system so please read the details of the programmes on the website and ring the providers directly.

- You will need your national insurance number or an asylum seekers support number.

Liverpool City Council is working with Mersey Play Action Council, Sutton Croft and the local schools, voluntary and community organisations, and childcare providers to deliver the Summer HAF programme. The programme is funded by the Department for Education.

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Under Clare's Law, you have the right to:

- -Make an application to the police requesting information about your current or ex-partner, because you are worried they may have been abusive in the past and believe they may pose a risk to you in future.
- -Request information from the police about the current or ex-partner of a close friend, neighbour or family member, because you are concerned that they might be at risk of domestic abuse in future.

This is called the 'right to ask.' You have a right to ask the police no matter if your enquiry relates to a heterosexual or same-sex relationship, as long as you are aged 16 or older. You also have the right to ask about a partner regardless of your (or your neighbour, friend or family member's) gender identity, ethnicity, race, religion or other characteristics.

You also have the 'right to know'. This means that if police checks show that your current or ex-partner has a record of violent or abusive behaviour, and they believe you may be at risk, they may decide to proactively share that information with you. If you're worried that your current or former partner has been abusive or violent in the past, Clare's Law was created to formally give you the right to find out.

An individual may be able to apply for a disclosure request by visiting a police station, phoning 101 or contacting your local police via email.
